Banks Get Call for Statement.

Local banks today received from the comptroller of the currency a call for a statement of their condition at the close of business on February 28.

All Teachers Now at Work.

Irrigation Bill Indorsed.

Senator McNary's \$250,000,000 irrigation bill for the various projects of the west on Tuesday received the indorsement of Alexander Vogelmann, acting secretary of the interior, at Washington. In a previous indorsement given by Secretary Lane it was recommended that the authorization be reduced to \$100,000,000. The latter bill is now pending.

The structure includes store rooms along Alta street to the corner of Cottonwood and marks the proposed structure as a slightly addition to the new business blocks of Pendleton.

Lambing Reported Good.

Lambing operations, which have been under way for about three weeks among the flocks of the Cunningham Sheep & Land Co. have been successful, according to report from Dr. S. W. McClure, manager. In that time about 1800 lambs have been born and the percentage which has survived is

exceptionally good. Grass on the ranges is doing very well considering the weather conditions, according to the manager. The only wool which has been clipped in this vicinity was from bucks and in tagging.

Tomorrow, March 4, is the Feast of Purim, a minor holiday of the Jewish calendar and has been observed by members of that faith beginning this evening.

Forty eight children of the Washington school were examined yesterday by Miss Florence B. Smiley, county health nurse and Miss Lela Cole, her assistant. They are continuing the work today.

Workmen began the excavation for the new Ellis-Schiller garage today. The building is to be located on the corner of Water and Main streets and is to be used for the headquarters for distribution of Dodge cars for which the company has the agency.

Rev. A. J. Sullens, of Portland, superintendent of Home Missions for the Congregational churches of this district, will preach at the Congregational church on Webb street on Sunday. The service will mark the reopening of the church which has been closed for several years.

Probably No Court.

It is probable that the U. S. District Court will not meet in Pendleton in April or at any time during the year, according to S. A. Newberry, clerk. Mr. Newberry says there are no cases to be tried this year. Criminal cases are tried in this city and civil cases in Portland.

The funeral of little Manuel Pedro, Jr., the six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Pedro, of Echo, will be held in Pendleton tomorrow at 9 a. m. at the Catholic church. The body will arrive here tonight on No. 18. Father Butler, of Hermiston, will conduct the services.

In a letter to friends here, James W. McCall, who formerly was employed by the Murphy Brothers paint store here, writes that he is doing well in business for himself at Berryville, Va. He has a paint and paper store in the southern city. Mr. McCall left here about a year and a half ago.

The police are holding Mike Peters and Doc Rudd for federal officers on charges of having given liquor to Indians. Peters was arrested several days ago as John Doe and a federal official is expected to come for him soon. Rudd was fined \$50 in the city courts yesterday and a charge lodged against him later by Major E. L. Swartlander, Indian agent.

May Have Paving Specifications.

The ground having been cleared last Wednesday by the adoption of an ordinance to conform with the state law regarding paving bids, the city council is expected at its meeting tonight to have ready the specifications for bidding on the city's contemplated street work. There are about 20 blocks of paving to be laid this spring and summer in Pendleton and the officials hope to get the work under way as early as possible. The greater part of the work will be on the north side.

No Fire Loss in February.

Not a dollar in fire loss was the record for February in Pendleton, according to Fire Chief W. E. Ringold today. There was one alarm, the department having been called out to extinguish a blaze caused by an auto backfire. There was no damage done to the car at that time. The chief attributes the record month to the working of fire prevention instruction and urges persons to continue to practice care in the prevention of fires.

Miss Sybil Hadwen, institutional manager, of O. A. C., will be in Pendleton Wednesday to outline plans for the construction of the kitchen in the basement of the Church of the Redeemer. 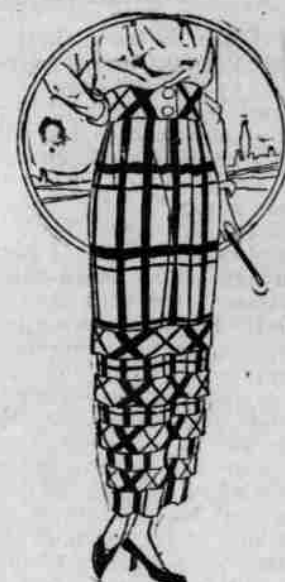
