WEST ENDERS BUSYING SELVES WITH POLITICS

(East Oregonian Special.)

HERMISTON, March 2.—Politics in the west end of the county are commencing to interest some of the citizens a little. The sentiment for president seems to be about even for Wood, Lowden and Hoover, and for U. S. senator is following political lines.

The county judgeship is more talked of than any other office. The republicans would like to see Joe Tallman of Pendleton, Herbert Boylen of Pilot Rock, Lowell Rogers of Pendleton or some such men urged to consent to allow his name placed on the ballot.

The democrats talk C. H. Marsh for re-election, and J. B. Saylor. Judge Marsh would have a strong support and would break into the republican lines and Mr. Saylor is considered strong timber. J. M. Shannon of Pilot Rock, the announced republican candidate, is not so well known. Zee Houser of Echo it is said, would make the race for sheriff against T. D. Taylor.

No one for Assessor or school superintendent has been mentioned and Bob Brown, Ben Burroughs and Grace Gilliam seem to be considered without opposition.

The legislative positions seem to be in the air. E. P. Dodd will probably soon make a statement as to his candidacy to succeed himself. He says he would like to see some soldier make the race but it is supposed otherwise his name will be on the ballot. C. G. Brownell has yet made no statement.

J. F. McNaught of Hermiston, Frank Sloan of Stanfield and Ralph Holte of Stanfield are considered good material. The joint representative is conceded to C. E. Woodson of Heppner.

WHITE COLLAR MEN GIVE UP PEN FOR PICK; MAKE MONEY

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 2.—A thousand dollars, a ticket to North Dakota and a pension await a "wandering doughboy in a fur coat" at the local Red Cross headquarters.

The ebb tide of the army brought Joe Lennore to Philadelphia from a nearby demobilization camp. He registered at the Salvation Army Hotel and from there was taken to St. Agnes' Hospital for treatment of his wounds. He wore eleven wound stripes, had a croix de guerre, two citations and medals from the Spanish-American War.

When discharged from the hospital he collected compensation through the Red Cross, bought a fur coat, and disappeared without leaving an address. Since then his compensation under the Sweet bill has piled up a thousand dollars to his credit. As he is gradually becoming blind he is given double disability, permanent insurance privileges, and in addition, the Public Health Service has a free ticket for him to return to his home in North Dakota.

He is a veteran of the Argonne and Chateau-Thierry.

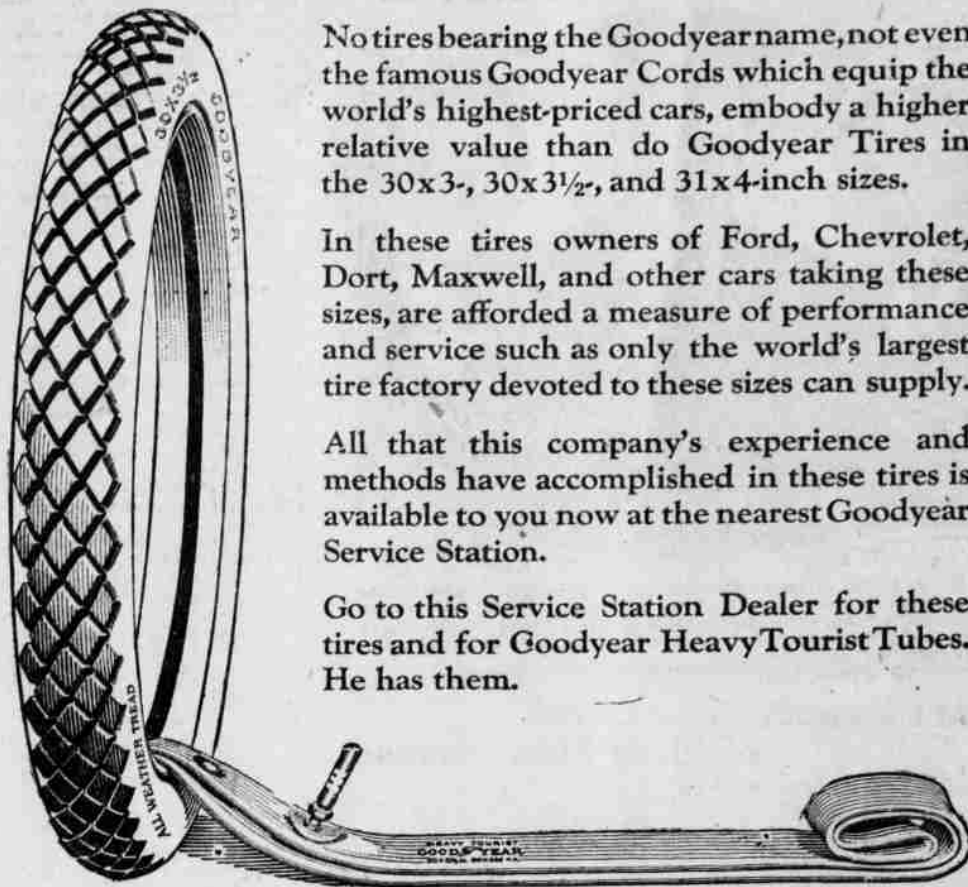
SEATTLE SAILORS SEE MASSACRE IN RUSSIA

SEATTLE, Mar. 2.—Several hundred people were killed during a revolution in Vladivostok harbor and the massacre was witnessed by the crew of the Seattle steamship Delight on the night of January 2, according to word brought here by the mate, B. Blukum today.

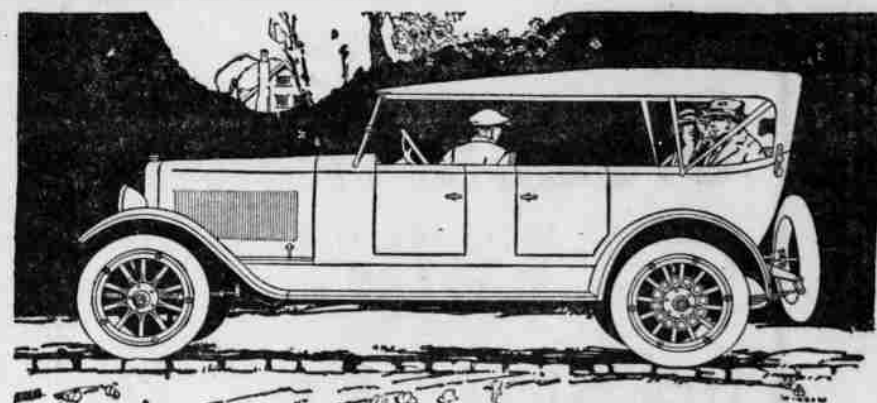
