The buildings are being removed to make way for the new warehouse around the Collins Flour Mills adjoining.

## Mill Trademark Placed on Window.

The trademark of the Collins Flour Mills was exhibited publicly for the first time today when it was placed upon the window of the offices on East Court street. It consists of a black triangle in which is depicted a native Indian at work grinding flour from grain in a stone mortar by means of

a stone pestle. The Indian is in red and the design was drawn by an artist in Seattle and copyrighted. It will appear upon all products of the mill, as well as on stationery and advertising matter.
