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A NATIONAL SCANDAL

TESTIMONY in the trial of those charged with corruption, fraud and conspiracy in connection with the election of Truman H. Newberry as United States senator from Michigan is unfolding a story of political debauchery exceeding in flagrant and boldness even that other historic instance of political criminality in Indiana, where votes were purchased "in blocks of five."

Republicans, along with other decent citizens of Michigan, are aghast at the revelations in the sworn testimony of witnesses, some of whom confess their parts in the scandal. The disclosures contain a lesson for the people everywhere. If a great slush fund is to decide between candidates for public office, only rich and unscrupulous men will be successful.

THE TEST SHOULD BE PERSONAL

CAPTAIN James McDowell, head of the police traffic bureau in Los Angeles, has declared that after years of observation and a study of the accident records that women should not be allowed to drive autos. He wants a state law forbidding a woman at the wheel of a car.

The traffic chief claims to have statistics to bear out his contention and he is no doubt sincere in his position. His mistake is in wanting to bar all women from driving when the proper course, applicable to men as well as to women would be to discriminate between the competent driver and the incompetent. It is not fair to say that all men are reliable as drivers and that no woman is to be trusted at the wheel. If a ban is to be placed on reckless drivers the test should be personal and not in accord with the views of the Los Angeles official.

THE WOOL SUPPLY

EVEN distribution of the commercial supply of wool on hand December 31 last, is indicated in a report issued by the department of agriculture covering stocks in the country on that date. The total holdings, the department announces, were 624,000,000 pounds, grease equivalent, or 105,000,000 less than on September 30, 1919.

Manufacturers reported holdings of 244,000,000, and dealers 242,000,000 pounds, grease equivalent. It was explained that the dealers did not own all the wool reported in their possession. In many cases they were agents for the real owners. Although the figures appear large, the department says, the amount of wool on hand was hardly more than a comfortable reserve.

The government's holdings of wool have decreased materially since last year. They were 383,746,502 pounds on December 28, 1918, but had fallen to 98,352,000 pounds on December 31, 1919. This shows, it is contended, that the government had released its wool holdings as rapidly as possible in such quantities as the market would readily absorb.

An argument filed in the primary election voters' booklet says there are 500 teaching vacancies in Oregon now and many teachers holding positions are unfit. Yet two years ago the Portland Oregonian advised voters to reject a fair and sane proposal for additional normal training in Oregon. The first problem confronting those who wish to restore education in Oregon is to educate the Portland press.

People did not journey afar and take their lunches to the courtroom, as during the Hawley divorce case at Oregon City, and for this fact the methods of Mary are entitled to commendation.

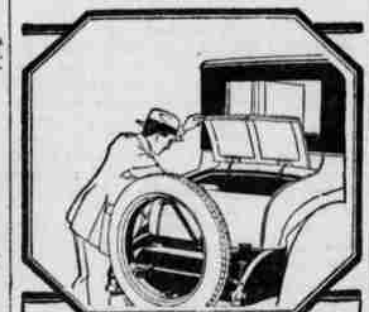
