

BAND HEADS FUNERAL PROCESSION FOR DEAD IN CHINATOWN FIRE

Bodies of 10, Buried in One Grave at Walla Walla, Are Escorted to Cemetery on Huge Purple Draped Truck.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., March 5.—Headed by a 35-piece band, the funeral procession for the 11 victims of the fire in Chinatown Monday night moved to the city cemetery yesterday afternoon where rites of the Chinese Masons were held over the bodies. After the services, the bodies of the 10 men were buried in one grave and the body of the Chinese woman, Maan, was brought back to the city and will be sent later to Portland for burial. Chung Hook of Portland, son of the fire, will settle his mother's affairs at Passco before returning home with the body.

Wong Hong of Portland, one of the officials of the Portland lodge of Chinese Masons, had charge of the services at the grave.

The body of the woman was carried to the cemetery in a hearse, but the caskets of the 10 men were arranged on a huge truck decorated with purple and white bunting. Chinese afoot and in autos followed the bodies. Several hundred Chinese were in the

MYRTLE POINT MAN SLUMBERS 64 DAYS

NORTH BEND, Or., March 5.—John Lowellyn, a resident of Myrtle Point, who was brought to Mercy hospital here afflicted with sleeping sickness, has passed the 64th day of the disease without any apparent change in his condition. During this period he has remained in a complete comatose condition and all efforts to arouse him from the unnatural slumber have proved futile. It is the first case of sleeping sickness reported in this section and on account of the peculiar nature of the malady, it is attracting considerable attention and is being closely studied by the local physicians. The ability of the sleeping man to partake of food with seeming relish and retain a certain amount of physical strength and vigor while in the lethargic condition causes his physicians to entertain hopes for his recovery.

CATTLEMAN MAY BUY COAST STOCKYARDS

PORTLAND, Or., Mar. 5.—Pacific coast cattlemen are considering the organization of associations on the California co-operative plan to purchase and control stockyards. The plan of operation suggested is for the cattlemen to own the stockyards as non-profit clearing houses for cattle on an actual cost basis. Each stockman would be charged his share of the actual cost of operating the yards, based upon the number of cattle which he sent to the yards annually. It is said that the form of organization proposed would eliminate the intermediate profit between the cattlemen and the packers which is now made by the stockyard companies.

KATHLEEN KLA-WAH-NA, OREGON INDIAN GIRL SPARKLES ON STAGE

The Pendleton vicinity, and other parts of this county, were once the home of Kathleen Kla-Wah-Na, Indian girl who has attained success on the stage. She recently told the story of her nationality in an article printed in a New York theatrical publication, and extracts from it are as follows:

"A number of actors, who knowing that I speak Spanish, refer to me as 'that Mexican.' Others, knowing that my father's name was of French extraction, declare that I am French. I feel sure that I am pure 'woy' and I myself, heard one refer to me as 'that Kike-Indian.' If I were really of all the nationalities that I am said to be, I would be more mixed than I am."

"It is quite true that my father was French-Irish, but it is also true that my mother, who is still living, is more Indian than French."

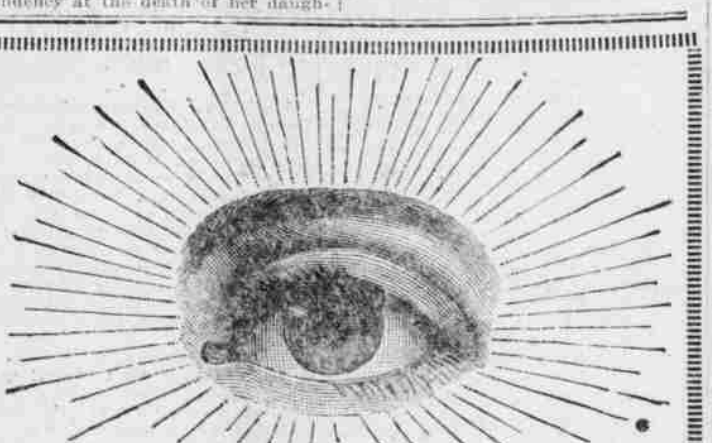
"Until I was about eight years old, I had not seen more than six all white children. Those early years were spent in Oregon, ranging from the vicinity of Castle Rock, on the Columbia, to the vicinity of Pendleton."

"I do speak Spanish, also Chinook, and for the benefit of those who have a smattering of the latter, I will say 'na' means 'how do you do.' 'Kla-wah-na' means 'how do you do.' 'Kla-wah-na' means 'clear water,' the name of the Columbia river. So much for my name which seems to have given some concern. Out west, in my school days, one did not advertise one's Indian blood, for father hardly relished the appellation of 'squaw-na,' but in these days and especially in the east, one seldom hears that word."
