HIDDEN OIL LINKS BIG BUSINESS AND ROMANCE

TOMPICO, Mexico, Mar. 6.—Romance and big business need not be strangers.

And there has always been romance in the oil business. It is the quest for hidden treasure—backed by the belief that America must explore the four ends of the world if she is to maintain her position in the international struggle for that treasure—that explains the ocean cruise of E. W. Marland, millionaire oil producer of Ponca City, Okla., and Pittsburgh, Pa., head of the Marland Refining Company and other interests.

Treasure Prompts Voyage
Petroleum is the hidden treasure that prompted the voyage of the steam yacht "Anelida." Traveling on his own private yacht, Marland and several of his associates lifted anchor here this week bound for the tropical waters of Latin America. Before his departure from Tampico, Marland had spent a

month in Mexico, investigating the oil resources of this country with a view of tending the field.

The "Anelida" will first call at Panama where Marland will take aboard four geologists of his organization. These men, headed by F. P. ("Spot") Geyer, former star fullback on the University of Oklahoma eleven, have spent the past several weeks searching Central America regions for evidence of oil formations. From Panama the yacht will steam to Caracas, Venezuela, where a couple of weeks will be spent in exploring the Lake Maracaibo district. The next call—with oil still the objective—will be at Colombia ports, and further time will be spent in a tour of investigation up the Orinoco River.

Up West of Mexico

After inspecting the oil resources of Venezuela and Colombia, the expedition will return northward, pass westward through the Panama Canal and resume its hunt for the earth's riches in Salvador and Nicaragua. Leaving the tropics, the "Anelida" will carry its owner up the west coast of Mexico.

Marland has deep faith in the oil possibilities of the Mexican states of Sonora and Sinaloa—faith so deep that in these states he plans to establish two or three geology camps, comprising about 200 men, of whom 25 or 50 will be expert geologists. Here romance and adventure again appear upon the scene, for in Sonora the hunt for petroleum will be made partially in country that is infested with bands of Yaqui Indians, one of the wildest and fiercest fighting Indian tribes alive to-day. Lower California may also be included within the zone of the Oklahoma oil man's investigation.

Among the men accompanying Marland on his cruise for oil are two of his associates, Col. Franklin R. Kenney, of Chicago and Ponca City, who served on Pershing's staff and later became Chief of Staff of the American Air Service; and W. H. McFadden, of Pittsburgh and Ponca City, one of America's pioneer steel men and builder of many of the earliest steel plants in the United States.
