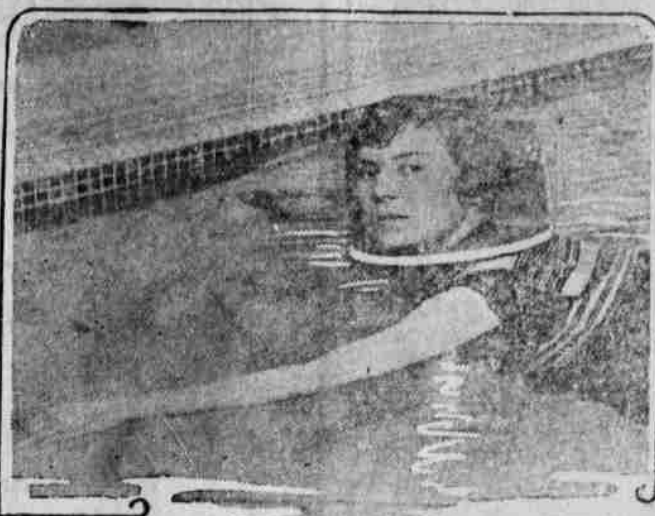

SWIMMING COLLAR AID TO LEARNERS



A new device of interest to swimmers and those learning to swim, is the "Swimming Collar," a water-tight affair made of transparent cellophane. It has a sheet of rubber across the bottom which fits snugly around the neck. Its designers claim it makes swimming easy as it holds one's head in a correct position. What is commonly known as "alkali" in the Yakum district contains silica, peroxide, soda and borax, and is valuable for use in making soap, according to William Rahe, who ships carloads of the soil to the Mid East Soap Company near Sandusky, Ohio. Mr. Rahe, who is a Pendleton pioneer, has been shipping about two carloads a year of the soil to the Rainier Mineral Soap company, at Buffalo, but now that he is employed by the new company he expects to ship eight or ten carloads a year. He leases the land at Yakum, which is the only place in Oregon where soil with qualities suitable for soap making is found.

Three floods at Stanfield have not discouraged W. T. Bray, editor of the Stanfield Standard. The first flood inundated the Standard office and left a neat deposit of rich silt on the floor of the building. By a miracle, the water did not reach the stock room so Mr. Bray's stock of paper, etc., was not damaged. Mr. Bray was in the city today from Stanfield.

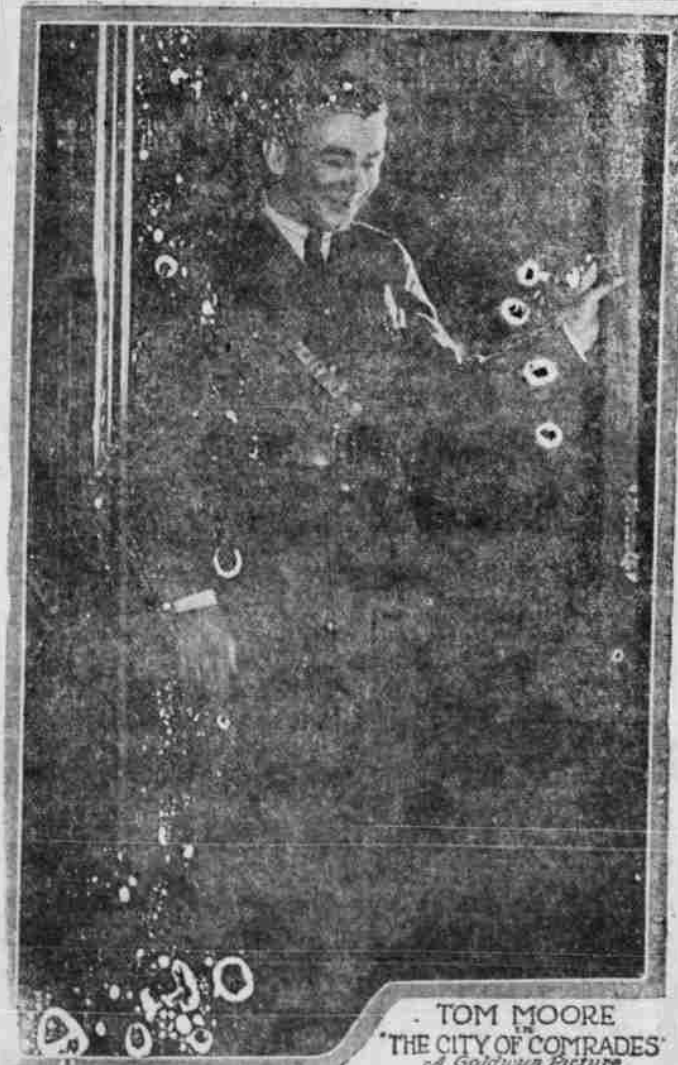
