Score of Additional Men Come.

Twenty additional highway workers arrived on No. 6 at Rieth this morning to go to work for Clifton, Applegate & Toole on the Old Oregon Trail highway. They were brought from Portland. The road around the point west of Rieth is nearly all blasted out of the side hill and a few more days will see it entirely graded. A few pieces of heavy rock work between Rieth and Echo remain to be completed within the next three weeks, but for the most part grading is very nearly completed. Murdered Man Known Here.

Richard Troy, alias "Wisconsin Dick" Clark, who was murdered in Portland Saturday night by Ralph Bruno, once spent time in the Umatilla county jail, according to Sheriff T. D. Taylor today. Troy was arrested at Echo by Deputy Sheriff Joe Blakley for breaking into a store there several years ago and was identified by Sheriff Taylor as one who had escaped from a middle western penitentiary eight years previously. The rogues' gallery kept by the sheriff established the man's identity. Troy was murdered by Bruno, because, the latter alleged, he was the cause of Bruno's wife recently obtaining a divorce.
