The alipes variety, known also as the white footed lemming mouse, is unique in that there are but seven known species, there are but seven known species, six found in Oregon and one in Southwestern of five of the species. The article will be illustrated by R. Bruce Horsfall, Portland artist who ranks among the three greatest artists in the United States who draw for scientific museums. 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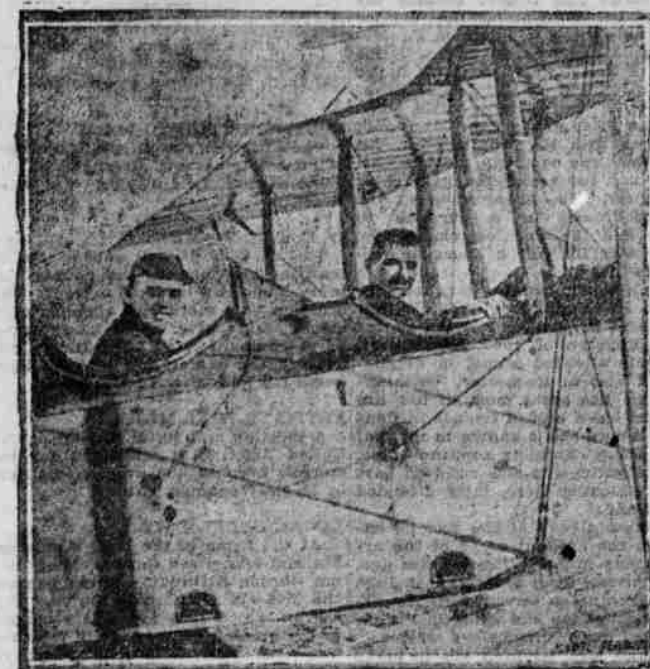
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AMERICAN FLIER, KILLED IN CRASH, GIVING LESSONS TO SON OF PRESIDENT OF PERU



Dispatches from Peru tell of the death of Walter Peck, an American pilot and trick flyer, his mechanic, A. Alta, also an American, and two Peruvian aviators when their airplane collided between Callao and Ancon. The planes were traveling in different directions and Peck, in a swifter machine, in performing evolutions around the Peruvian flier's plane, crashed into it. Peck was representing an American aircraft manufacturer and had sold a number of machines. The second plane he sold was bought by Juan Leguia, son of the president of Peru.
