## REFUSAL OF FRENCH TO STAND DURING GERMAN SONG STARTS RIOTING

Diners Hurl Bottles and Glasses  
at Officers' Party as Ex-Kaiser's  
Relative Tips Orchestra  
to Play Air.

BERLIN, March 8.—Refusal of two French officers, attached to the French mission here, to stand when "Deutschland Über Alles" was played in the dining room of the Hotel Adlon last night precipitated a general fight in which Prince Albrecht, a relative of the former Kaiser, is said to have been the aggressor.

The Frenchmen were badly battered by the Germans. They were cut and bruised by bottles, glasses and can also hurled at them. Walters finally succeeded in escorting the French from the dining room.

Prince Albrecht, a witness said, followed his usual custom of tipping the orchestra to play the German national song. The French party, consisting of two captains, accompanied by another Frenchman and a woman, did not arise.

### MAY PUBLISH COURT ACTION

## U. S. MUST CONTINUE SHIP BUILDING UNTIL LEAGUE IS ACCEPTED

Secretary Daniels Declares  
Great Pre-War Naval Program  
Cannot be Abandoned  
Unless Treaty is Ratified.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The United States must continue its pre-war naval building program until it is determined whether this country is to be a member of the league of nations, Secretary Daniels told the house naval affairs committee Saturday.

The complete program which Daniels recommended calls for only 69 vessels, but to treaty delay, belief is that it will not be ratified in this session. If the United States definitely decides to stay out of the league the United States must immediately start to build the greatest navy in the world, the secretary declared. If the treaty is ratified, huge naval expenditures can be checked, he said, adding that gradual disarmament may follow.

### Cost 95 Million

He said the cost of the immediate building program recommended would be \$195,390,000.

The Daniels program, which he said should be carried in the appropriation bill now being framed by the committee, calls for two of the biggest battleships in the world, one battle cruiser, six scout cruisers, 20 light cruisers, 8 mine-laying cruisers, 20 flotilla leaders, 4 fleet submarines, 4 airplane carriers, one submarine tender, and one destroyer tender.

### Must Join League

If the senate authorizes the United States to join the league of nations and the proposed construction of all battleships and battle and scout cruisers could be abandoned, the number of light cruisers reduced to 10, the mine laying light cruisers to six and the flotilla leaders to 10.

### BLIZZARD SWEEPS EAST

NEW YORK, March 8.—The east is suffering combined storm and flood conditions, resulting in hundreds of thousands of dollars damage. A blizzard which swept the west turned into a terrific gale as it swirled across eastern states and out to sea. Three ships were driven ashore and others are reported in danger. Wire communication and railway traffic is seriously impeded.

## WINS ESSAY CONTEST

PERHAPS YOU ARE A CHAMP IN SOME LINE  
BUT HERE ARE THE RECOGNIZED LEADERS

NEW YORK, March 8.—Claim a title and you can have it.

That seems to be the theory of modern fighters and wrestlers.

It's a catch to become a champion when acquisition of the crown entails no more effort than the wind of a few words from some manager.

The woods are full of "A. E. F. champions," "Inter-Allied champions," "French champions," "English champions," etc.

The records do not bear out the claims of most of the assuming champions and near champions.

Holders of the world's titles are established. The international boxing union has recognized as legitimate the crowns held by Jack Dempsey, heavyweight; Mike O'Dowd, middleweight; Jack Britton, welterweight; Benny Leonard, lightweight; Johnny Kilbane, featherweight; Pete Herman, bantamweight; and Jimmy Wilde, flyweight.

The title of light heavyweight champion was declared vacant.

European Champions Listed

The European champions recognized by the I. B. F. are: Jimmy Wilde, flyweight; Charles Ledoux, France, bantamweight; Albert Badoud, France, welterweight; and Georges Carpentier, light heavyweight and heavyweight.

The featherweight, lightweight and middleweight divisions were declared championless.

Most of the hoax surrounds the champions of the "inter-allied" championship titles. The athletic committee of the United States army, headed by Col. Walt C. Johnson, under whose supervision the "military Olympic" was held, recognizes the following "inter-allied" champions:

## GERMANY, IN CAMPAIGN TO BOLSTER VALUE OF MARK, USING SANDWICH ADVERTISEMENTS



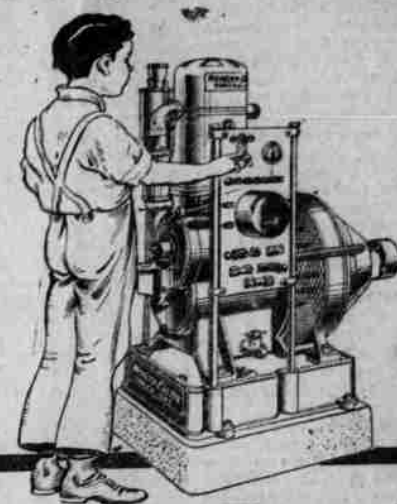
