**Bushman Forget Check Here.**  
Andrew Bushman, Indian youth held at Lewiston for forgery, is also wanted here on a similar charge, having recently passed a check for \$125, according to District Attorney R. I. Keator. It is thought possible that he is implicated in the theft of the Thomas Thompson car and of another car at Yakima.

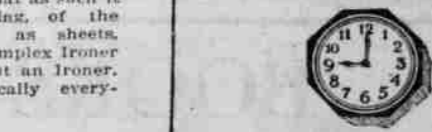
