## DAVID WARFIELD STRUCK BY CAR; LEG IS BROKEN

LOS ANGELES, March 12.—David Warfield, dean of American actors, was seriously injured here Friday when hit by a light delivery truck as he was crossing the Fifth street. Charles Brown, a boy of 19, was driving the vehicle. Warfield was struck by the right front fender of the automobile and thrown against another car. The boy lifted the actor to his machine and drove him to the receiving hospital, where he was given first aid. Dr. E. A. Bryant, who attended him, stated that the actor suffered a double break of the left lower leg, a severe laceration of the nose and a deep cut on the lip. He will be confined to bed for at least eight weeks. Manager Wyatt of the Mason Opera house where Warfield has been playing in "The Auctioneer," said he would immediately sue the company employing the boy driver for \$25,000 damages, as every seat in the house had been sold out for the entire period of Warfield's stay here.

## UMATILLA COUNTY 'Y' DECLARED SUCCESS

The Y. M. C. A. county work in Umatilla county, after a trial of four months, is declared in a pamphlet just issued by the directors, to be a success. Umatilla county was one of two counties in the state to be organized last October for this new branch of work and results so far are declared to be entirely satisfactory to the county committee of 17 men which directs the work of the secretary, Cash Wood.

The county work of the Y. M. C. A. undertaken here and in Marion county, is a plan which brings the fundamentals of the Y. M. C. A. program to the smaller towns and rural districts. Secretary Wood explains. Large buildings, equipment and paid secretaries such as characterize the organization in cities, are not used. Equipment already existing, such as schools, halls, churches, is utilized. The only salaried officer is the county secretary.

**Volunteer Leadership Aids.** Organization and adult volunteer leadership of the young men and boys are the factors depended upon for the success of the program. Local groups of men and boys for mental, moral and physical development are sought in every town and community.

Among the first things accomplished by the organization in this county was the winning of the older boys' conference for northern Oregon for Pendleton in October, 1929. At the 1919 conference at The Dalles, this county was represented by 47 delegates from seven of the county towns. Nearly half of the total attendance was from this county.

During the winter gymnasium classes were organized at Adams, Athena and Milton, but Adams was the only purely successful venture. Men's gymnasium classes were organized here and have also been successful, using the high school gymnasium for their work.

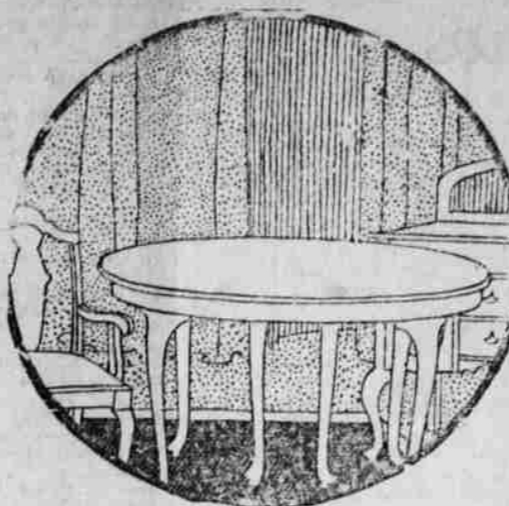
### Pendleton "Y" Organized.

A Pendleton Young Men's Christian Association has recently been organized with a directorate of five men. It is a permanent organization with its own membership, by-laws and regulations. It has no property nor employed staff and is not planning on any as yet. It is an association unit, with Pendleton using the same facilities as the smaller towns, namely, the buildings, halls and churches having available equipment. This association is now fostering athletics between the towns of five Sunday schools in the city, with junior, intermediate and senior teams playing every Saturday. The father and son banquet here and in five other towns of the county is attributed to the efforts of the county organization. In every town the banquet was a success, Pendleton having had nearly twice as large an attendance as was anticipated.

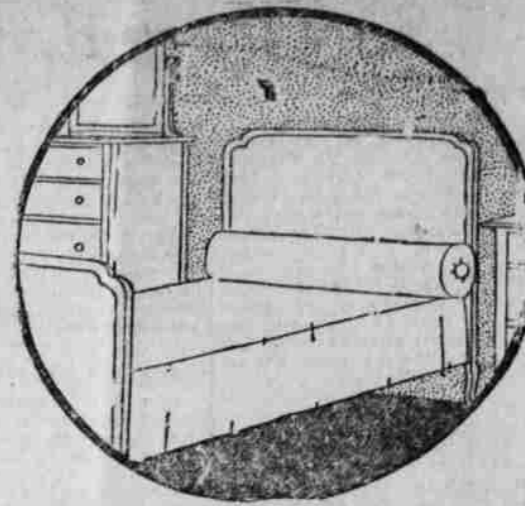
Other work of the association in the county includes a junior boys' club at Echo under the leadership of Joel Davis, free educational service for former service men, thrift week promotion and closer co-operation with the schools of the county.

**Work in Prospect.** The affairs which the association has in prospect for the immediate future include the organization in the towns of high school clubs, organization of boys clubs, the promotion of spring athletics, such as baseball, track meets and aquatic; numerous hikes and summer camps in the county, and the older boys' conference at Pendleton in October, which will be attended by boys from all of north-
