For thirty years E. E. Kiddle, of La Grande, was a member of the school board. Later he served in the legislature in the Senate, and then he was made a member of the State Highway Commission. Mr. Kiddle arrived in the city this morning and motored to Echo on road business with Judge C. H. Marsh, M. O. Bennett, highway engineer, and G. L. Dunning, county commissioner.

Heppner and the other towns of Morrow county have a few more American citizens now than before Tuesday, a session of the circuit court having been held there for naturalization on Tuesday. A part of the Scholl plan is to cooperate with schools and Dr. Goodwin spoke today at the high school and illustrated his lecture with slides.

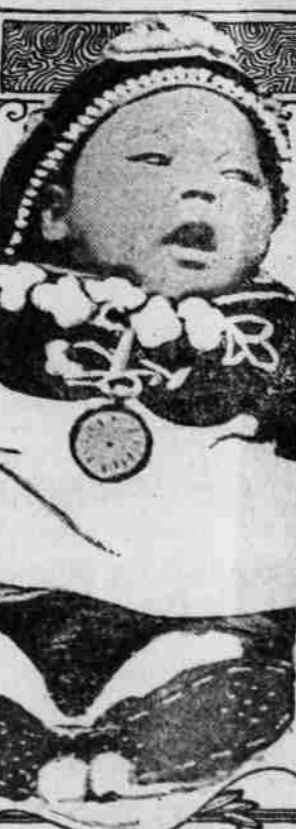
