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TOO MUCH CAMOUFLAGE

MR. HOOVER'S statement to the republicans of California is that he will accept the republican nomination if the party adopts a forward looking, constructive platform on the treaty. Since he urged the senate to vote for the treaty with the Lodge reservations it may be assumed he will regard a platform that approves those reservations as forward looking and constructive.

But the Lodge reservations are reactionary and destructive. The reservation to article 10 defiantly rejects the main article in the covenant. It provides for the pre war status, nothing more nor less. It is a flat repudiation of the Monroe doctrine. The Lodge reservation on article 10 was written not to get the treaty ratified but to keep it from being ratified. It was dictated by the bitter treaty foes led by Johnson and Borah. Those gentlemen with all their faults have not lacked in directness. They have not camouflaged their intentions. They have been against the league, first, last and all the time and have frankly said so.

The League of Nations issue is to be the main point in controversy in the presidential election and the people are entitled to have the subject presented fairly and squarely. It is not square dealing for any candidate to assert he is for the league yet at the same time is favorable to destroying the principal feature in the covenant. Since Mr. Hoover shows his friendship for the treaty by joining hands with those who killed it he is one type of man the true supporters of the League of Nations cannot afford to trust. That class of talent in the senate had charge of the treaty for nearly a year and they disgraced Uncle Sam. They have caused the United States to lose the high prestige gained during the war. They are now striving for a separate peace with Germany, leaving France and Belgium and all our other allies to protect themselves the best they can. The only way America can redeem herself in the eyes of humanity is to repudiate Lodgeism at the polls this fall and elect a president who is honestly committed to ratification of the treaty without destructive reservations.

THEIR DUTIES TREBLED; THEIR INCOME REDUCED

SINCE 1913 the millage support for higher education in Oregon has grown only three and eight-tenths per cent. The State University in 1920 receives from the millage tax only \$10,846 more than it would have received in 1913. The Agricultural College receives only \$14,462 more.

The University's enrollment in the same seven years however, has increased one hundred and fifty-two per cent. In 1913 there were 691 students; but there are now 1745.

Similarly, the Agricultural College's enrollment has increased one hundred and forty-eight per cent. In 1913, there were 1364 students; but there are now 3378.

That is, the number of students has increased about forty times as much as the millage support.

Only full-time students in residence are included in the foregoing figures. No extension, field demonstration, winter short course, summer school, correspondence-study, or other students are included.

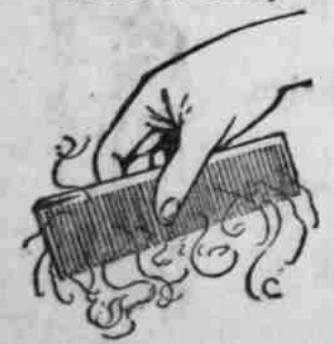
In these divisions, too, there has been vast increase since 1913. In fact, the registration in University and Agricultural College work, not including field demonstrations or any such short courses, is about 10,000, and the number of full-time students is more than 5100.

If the cost of living had declined during the seven years, the University, the Agricultural College, and the Normal might have had a chance to maintain their standard of work. Everyone knows, however, what the cost of living has done since the millage bill was first passed. It has risen about 100 per cent. A dollar today has the buying power of about 45 cents in 1913.

In other words, the three institutions are trying in 1920 to train two and one-half times as many students on one-half the income, as compared with 1913.

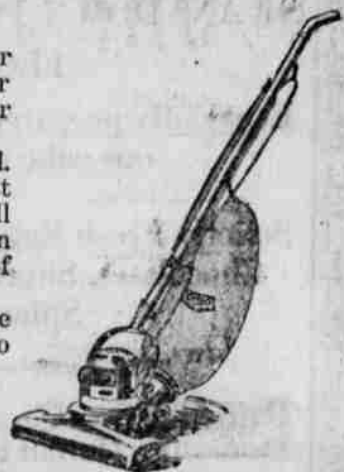
