ROOSEVELT PLEADS FOR REINSTATEMENT OF FIVE

ALBANY, N. Y., April 1.—Lieutenant Colonel Roosevelt, in a speech before the assembly today urged that the five suspended socialist members be reinstated. He took issue with the majority report of the judiciary committee which tried the socialists, in which it was stated that the socialists, as individuals and as a party have been proved disloyal.

Roosevelt argued that a graver question before the assembly is expulsion of the socialist party and that such an act would be to "commit a crime against representative government."
