The league has representatives on hand when milk is shipped to Portland milk dealers, and these representatives see that tests for butterfat are authentic. A marriage license was issued today to Frank H. Stone and Allice Marion Prann, both of Hermiston.

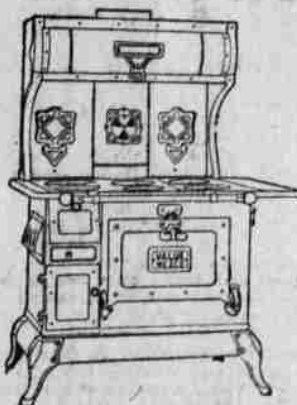
Two Umatilla Men File.

Winter, of Portland, formerly a partner of Judge Lowell's. Two similar cases, in which George Strand and Edgar Smith are plaintiffs and the grain agency defendant, will follow.

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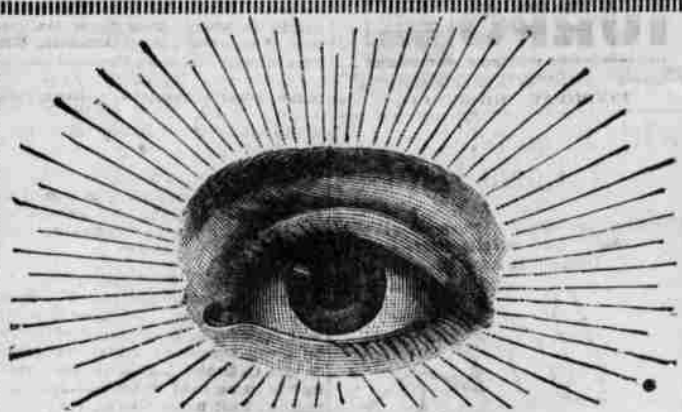
