Madman immortalized the Spirit of Spring with his "Morning of the Year" and Mrs. S. H. Forshaw chose the beautiful song cycle in presenting last evening a group of her advanced pupils in voice. They were Miss Mary Wilkes, Miss Lillian Culley, Mrs. Ernest McNeely and Mrs. Raymond Hatch, the latter two singing in the cycle in the presentation of which Mrs. Forshaw was assisted by Mrs. Charles Heard, accompanist, Clyde Phillips, tenor, and Earl Fleischman, baritone.

The musicale was given in the Presbyterian church, where delicate hydrangea blossoms and clusters of jonquills flanked the chance.

Miss Wilkes opened the program with a group of songs delightful as an introduction for the evening, her first number, "To Spring" (Gounod), being especially charming. Miss Lillian Culley was also presented in a group of songs, "Blossoming Time" (Needham) being her final and one of the most pleasing numbers.

In the cycle, Mrs. McNeely took the soprano parts and Mrs. Hatch the contralto. The plans accompanist proved one of the most compelling features in the success of the presentation. Mrs. Heard interpreted exquisitely Cadman's portrayal of the moods of spring, and her unerring technique and wealth of tone picture were colorful, indeed.

A piano prelude precedes the quartet, solos and duets, which build the cycle and an intermezzo divides the interpretation of the whims of March and April from part two devoted to May.

Invocation, "Spirit Arise," by Mrs. McNeely, the solo, "All the World is Spring Today" by Mr. Fleischman, "The Brooklet Came from the Mountain" solo by Mr. Fleischman, and "The Moon Behind the Cotton Wood," by Mrs. Hatch, prompted special appreciation of the individual work, and as an able finale, reflecting credit upon the singers, upon Mrs. Heard, and upon Mrs. Forshaw was the last "goodbye," a quartet, "O Spirit of the Spring."

## BELGIUM AND FRANCE FORMING AN ALLIANCE

(By Associated Press.)  
PARIS, April 14.—The conclusion of a defense military entente between Belgium and France is imminent, according to a statement of the Belgian ambassador to the Petit Parisien. The nature of the understanding sought between the two countries has not been clearly defined.

**G. Y. HARRY WOULD BE DELEGATE-AT-LARGE TO DEMOCRATIC MEET**

Mr. Harry has been an active leader in the ranks of the democratic party for the last 20 years, was assistant secretary of the democratic central committee in 1914 and managed the campaign of that year from the headquarters in Portland.

During the 1916 campaign Mr. Harry visited this section in his travels when covering the state for the Woodrow Wilson League of which he was general organizer and manager. This was the famed method by which democratic management reduced the huge Oregon majority of the

republican party to 6744 votes. He has asked that the following 12 words be printed on the official ballot after his name:

"There is no greater honor than to delegate to the democratic national convention."

In his 100 word statement that accompanied his declaration of candidacy to the secretary of state, Mr. Harry said:

"I have been actively interested in the welfare of the democratic party of Oregon for twenty years and I ask no higher distinction or greater honor than to represent it as delegate-at-

large to the democratic national convention.

"I will advocate a forward looking, constructive platform built upon the fundamental principles of Democracy, accentuating our continued fight against special privilege and financial domination and

"The Woodrow Wilson League of Nations with interpretative reservations which will not impair its strength or place America in the huddling position of foreign preference rights over the other signatories to this immortal covenant of civilization to represent it as delegate-at-
