Washington Farmers Ask Government Wheat Guarantee. (Associated Press.)  
 SPEKANE, April 15.—A. D. Cross of this city, has been named to represent the State Farmers' Union and Walter E. Price of Waitsburg has been selected as the representative of wheat growers of the Walla Walla district at the conference of western wheat growers to be held at Kansas City April 22. It was announced today. Other delegates from this section are E. J. Doonan of Oakesdale, for the Palouse district, and Almer McCurtain of Davenport, from the Big Bend.

The delegates are to support a government guarantee on the price of wheat for a number of years, it was decided at a conference of wheat growers of Eastern Washington here last week.

Coffee Futures Go Up With Better Tone Reported. (Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, April 15.—The market for coffee futures was higher today owing to reports of a better tone in Brazil and expectations of an increased spot demand as soon as the transportation conditions improve. The opening was 5 to 10 points higher and active months sold 13 to 25 points above last night's closing figures with May touching 14.62c and September 14.62c. The close was within two or three points of the best, showing a net advance of 13 to 20 points. Closing bids: April 14.47c; May 14.60c; July 14.87c; September 14.60c; October 14.55c; December 14.49c; January 14.47c.

Spot coffee quiet: Rio 7a 15c; Santos 4's 23 3/4 to 24 1/2c.

No Arrivals Reach Portland Stock Yards. (Associated Press.)

No carload supplies of livestock entered the North Portland alleys for the Thursday trade; the only supply being

a few drivings of hogs and sheep. Some nearby spring lambs were brought in by trucks during the day, but this scant supply was quickly snapped up at \$19, which indicates a full, steady tone.

Strong demand is showing for cattle, but the railroad strike is interfering with arrivals here. Nothing at all came forward during the last 24 hours.

Situation in the swine trade continues to reflect strength with a few drivings the total offering in the Portland alleys or Thursday.
