American hospitals there. She had previously been director of war work in Oregon and the five southern counties of Washington. The book work in the spruce camps was organized by her.

Has Been in Poor Health. Miss Isom has been in poor health since her return from France. It was only about 10 days ago, however, that she was confined to her home as a result of her illness although even then she took an interest in the work of the library and assisted in solving many of the library's problems.

Library Flourishes. Under the direction of Miss Isom the Portland public library in the course of eighteen years became an institution of definite value in the educational life and progress of the city. This was due largely to her conception of a library as something more than a mere repository of books.

Many Lectures Given. There were, for example, 3263 lectures and meetings in the central building and its branches, with an attendance of more than 100,000. More than 10,000 questions were answered, of which more than 1500 were of a serious and important nature, a number of educational exhibits were opened to the public and co-operation was established with the University of Oregon extension courses and with the Oregon State Library which greatly widened the influence of all.

TO INSPECT ALASKA CANNERY OPERATIONS

Gilbert, head of the department of zoology at Stanford university, will leave this month for Alaska to investigate reports that commercial cannery operations at the mouth of the Yukon are seriously menacing the fish supply of Indians living along the stream. The inspection trip, according to Mr. O'Malley, was authorized as the result of complaints made by Archbishop Ruck, Episcopal bishop of Alaska, that the cannery operations prevented salmon from migrating up the river, and that na-

tives were facing a serious fish shortage.
