## FINAL OLYMPIC TRYOUT TO BE HELD AS EVENT OF A. A. U. TOURNAMENT

### Titular Games Will be Held in Harvard Stadium July 17 and Will Not be Metric Num- bers as at Antwerp.

NEW YORK, April 16.—Events to be contested at all American Olympic tryout meets this summer will be the regular amateur athletic union standard track and field competitions in place of the Olympic metric events that will prevail at Antwerp. This decision, announced today, is necessitated by the fact that the final trial for places on the American team, which will sail for Belgium on July 24, will be held in conjunction with the amateur athletic union championships.

According to the present plans the A. A. U. titular games will be staged in the Harvard stadium at Boston on Saturday, July 17, and will be preceded by sectional Olympic tryouts at Philadelphia and Chicago on June 26, and Pasadena, July 2. The final trials for places on the steeplechase and decathlon teams will be held here during the week beginning July 11 and will be conducted under Olympic standards and regulations.

## PAIR PLAY CHESS BY WIRELESS, ONE IS IN CAPITAL, OTHER, CHICAGO

CHICAGO, April 16.—A game of chess by wireless, believed to be the first on record between Edward Lasker of Chicago, and A. P. Whittaker of Washington, tonight awaited decision by George Cambianca, pan-American chess champion, as to the victor. The game started at 8 o'clock last night and ended at 10:25 o'clock this morning. The moves made by the Washington man were telephoned from the capital city club to the naval operator at the Arlington wireless station. Messages were received at an amateur's station in Chicago and relayed to the Illinois Athletic club.

## BOB MARTIN'S RISE TO FISTIC FAME IS SLOW

Bob Martin, who won the inter-club heavy-weight ring championship in France, is apparently not making rapid strides toward his world's championship goal. Although he has been fighting in this country for many months, since his return from the army, and notwithstanding he has taken part in nearly a score of contests he is still seeking engagements no higher in class than the third or fourth rate division.

This is evident from the recent announcement that for next July 5 he has been matched with former A. A. U. Champion Marty Burke of New Orleans, a heavy-weight, who, though widely press-agented, not many weeks ago suffered a knockout at the hands of George Chip, a middleweight of waning reputation.

Martin has not been fighting much of late and not one of his contests has met an opponent known to be dangerous. Practically all of his foes have been "unknowns" or "has-beens" like Jack Moran, Arthur Pelkey, etc.

Jimmy Branson, Martin's manager, said when Martin returned to the U. S. that his man would be brought along gradually before seeking a bout with Jack Dempsey for the world's championship. That was right and proper. But it seems almost time to graduate from Class Z into a realm higher up, say into the division with Carl Morris, Gunboat Smith, Bob Dovere and others whose belt is not quite shot!

## DEMPESEY WANTED FOR JULY FIGHT IN MICHIGAN

Jack Dempsey's trial for draft evasion will come up April 17. A promoter of Benton Harbor, Mich., which is very close to Chicago, is so confident that Dempsey will be vindicated that he has signed him to fight July 5 at Benton Harbor.
