Deputy Warberton left for Elletson to serve papers and encountered the three men en route, according to the report. He died at 8 o'clock last night. A posse left Deer Lodge immediately after the report of the wounding of Warberton and killed one of the robbers, captured another and is in pursuit of the third.

SUPREME COURT WILL MEET HERE ON MAY 3

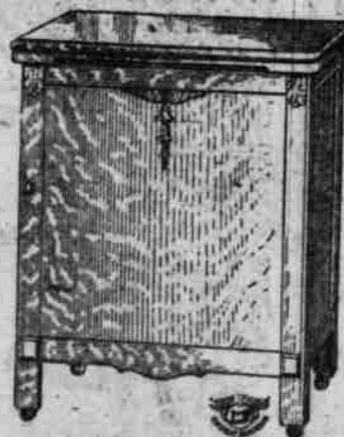
