CAUSE OF STRICKEN IS PLEAD BY AMBASSADOR

(By Associated Press.)
ATLANTA CITY, N. J., April 29.—Sir Auckland Geddes, British ambassador to the United States, pleaded the cause of stricken Europe to several hundred members and guests of the chamber of commerce of the United States in eighth annual session last night. Edwin T. Meredith, secretary of agriculture, and Admiral William Benson, chairman of the United States shipping board, were other speakers before the general session.

"The great American spirit," Sir Auckland said, "must assist Europe to its feet, and if this assistance were not forthcoming promptly, it might eventually cause America to be confronted with the crisis European problems that are causing so much unrest."

"Are you going to stand by and wait for Europe's troubles to come after you, as come they will, or are you going out to help Europe win through to reasonable conditions?" he asked.

Farming was pictured as confronted with more serious difficulties than any

Great Interest Shown.

Superintendent Greco says that intense interest is manifested by the pupils. He takes this as an indication of the success of physical culture, which was taught this year for the first time in the schools throughout the state.

All events for the meet have been placed in three groups, which will be run off simultaneously, with judges for each group. The groups have been divided into the following: A, baseball and javelin throwing; B, high jump, broad jump, pole vault and shot put and C, track events.
