PILOT ROCK, May 1.—The bankrupt sale of the property of Arnold Hoefft was held Wednesday at the Hoefft ranch northwest of here. Chief Roberts of Pendleton was auctioneer. The farm machinery and stock sold

at good prices, while the 400 acres of growing crop sold for \$4200. It was bought by Robert Hoefft, father of the bankrupt. A number of the people from Pilot Rock attended the sale.

These bonds are not only a general obligation of the city but are specifically secured by pledge of "tax arrears" aggregating more than double the outstanding bonds, which are collected are usable for the sole purpose of redeeming these bonds on interest dates. Denomination \$1000. Dated October 1, 1919. Due October 1, 1929.

Price \$6.58 and accrued interest. To yield 7½ per cent for 9½ years.

Those bonds retired early will yield several times 7.50 per cent by reason of the 12.42 per cent discount added to the 5½ per cent interest, bonds that cost \$6.58 being paid at 100.

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
