Pullman Rates Go Up

Increased Pullman rates amounting to 50 per cent went into effect today, according to information received at the local O. W. R. & N. office. The increase affects only the fares which are in excess of \$2. Thus there will

be no increase in the rate for births in the sleeper from Pendleton to Portland, the price for a berth being \$2 and the price for an upper \$1.60.

Judges Will Be Honor Guests

Six justices of the state supreme court will be guests of honor Monday evening at a session of Pendleton lodge No. 52, A. F. & A. M. After the dinner for them at 6:30 p. m., they will put on work in the master mason degree. Justice George H. Burnett, a past grand lecturer, will officiate. In the afternoon the master mason degree will be given a class, the work beginning at 4 o'clock.

Shearing in Coombs Canyon

Shearing has begun on the Umatilla County Sheep company's bands in Coombs Canyon. Later the shearers will begin shearing the Tulloch and Smythe sheep. Because of the cold weather, the shearing season is from 10 days to two weeks late. Some losses to hands sheared recently have been reported, among them the loss of 2000 out of 4000 sheep to one Umatilla county owner.

Forest Protection Urged

May 23 to May 29 has been designated as forest protection week, according to information received today at the Umatilla forest office. The Portland forestry office is working out a program for the week to impress upon citizens, especially those who contemplate visiting and camping in the forests during the summer, the necessity of precaution against the spread of fires. Governor Olcott has issued a proclamation relative to fire protection week.

Hoppe Makes High Averages

A grand average of 62 1-2 points was made by William Hoppe, world's billiard champion, in his two exhibition games of 250 points each yesterday afternoon and evening at the Coey. He was opposed by Charles C. Peterson, fancy shot expert. In the afternoon, Hoppe ran 115 and 134, going out in two innings with an unfinished run. It required six innings for him to go out in the evening game. His high run of the evening was 98. In his first two frames he made 101 and 100, respectively. Peterson entertained with a number of fancy shots after watching Hoppe run down his string in billiards.

Dr. McClure at Meeting

The wool growers meeting held at Hoppper today is attended by Dr. S. W. McClure, manager of the Cunningham Sheep and Land Company, and Jay Dobbin, Walla Walla county sheepman who is president of the State Wool Growers Association. They will present the plan for the proposed concentration wool sales in Portland. The plan originated at a meeting of Umatilla and Morrow county wool growers, who met here under the auspices of the Umatilla County Farm Bureau. The meeting here was followed by a meeting in Portland of growers, buyers and warehousemen, who advocated the concentrated sales in Portland.

Miss Walsh in Serbia

Miss Stasia P. Walsh, Pendleton nurse who was chosen as one of the two nurses from the United States to go overseas for post-war work under the auspices of the Red Cross, is now in Belgrade, Serbia. In a letter to Pendleton friends, Miss Walsh says that after arriving in Belgrade from Paris, she was placed in charge of a clinic for Serbian children and examines from 55 to 60 children each day. She is assisted by a Serbian girl who speaks about a dozen words of English, by a Serbian who speaks only the native language, and by a Bulgarian, prisoner of war. Miss Walsh describes the city as one of 150,000 inhabitants, with a queer mixture of East and West. She says food is plentiful but clothing scarce. Miss Walsh expects to be sent to Rome, Athens or Constantinople in September.
