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AGAINST SELFISH NATIONALISM

THE suggestion that the United States should take the Armenian mandate will find especial favor with church people who sympathize with Armenia because of the years of religious persecution it has suffered at the hands of the Turks. They would like to see Armenia have a chance. Church people above all others will oppose a policy of selfish Americanism.

In a statement elicited by numerous inquiries from European correspondents, the Rev. Charles S. MacFarland, general secretary of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, defends his fellow countrymen from the inferences drawn in many quarters that the American people have lain down on their task of international leadership in world reconstruction.

"I have no hesitancy in saying," Dr. MacFarland states, "that not only the more thoughtful and informed elements of the American people, but the American people as a whole, deeply desire that our nation should take its share of international responsibility, and that in this matter the people are in sympathy with the ideals set before the peace conference by President Wilson. This is entirely regardless of the question as to whether or not they personally approve President Wilson's course and the methods which he pursues. I am equally unhesitating in saying that neither the action of the United States senate nor the attitude of the president expresses the mind and will of our people."

"If one desires to estimate properly the American spirit and attitude, he would do best to go back and view it as it existed in 1913. The purpose of our people, with regard to justice and righteousness in the world has not changed, nor are they desirous that we should selfishly shirk our responsibility any more than we did then."

"The heart of the American people is still with the people of Europe in their problems and in their needs. Undoubtedly there were actions by the peace council, allotments of territory and matters of that kind, with which our people are not in sympathy. They believe that some, and perhaps many of the decisions of the peace conference will need to be reconsidered, revised, and in some cases, reversed. They believe, however, that these questions could hardly be adequately settled in so short a time and that they could be best settled by long and patient conference on the part of the Council of the League of Nations."

"Meanwhile, after a little time, our people will find themselves as they did in 1917 and 1918."

"Our people as a whole are absolutely against the principle of national selfishness, whether in America or in European nations. They believe that the interests of one are involved in the interest of all."

While Dr. MacFarland does not wholly approve of the president's course it is apparent that his sympathies are with Wilson rather than with the treaty foes in the senate or elsewhere.

It would be in line with good Americanism and in line with the Wilson policies to accept the Armenian mandate. It is timely to note however that the president would probably not have his way even should he wish to accept the mandate. It would require congressional approval and the majority of congressmen are said to be opposed.

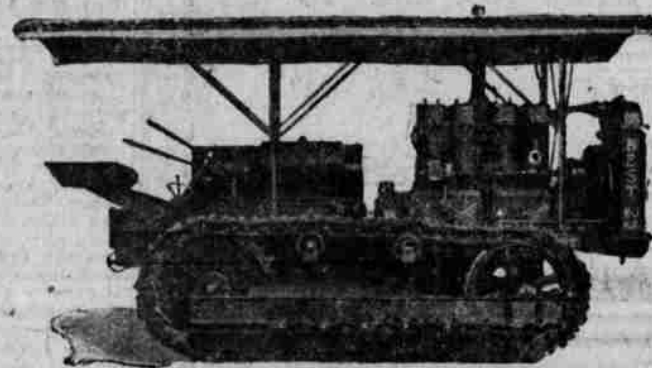
J. F. Temple, who was here Friday from his new home on the Umatilla below Pendleton, reports the outlook excellent on his orchard.
