NEARLY 200 TOURNEYS IN OFFICIAL TENNIS LIST

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, May 1.—Close to 200 sanctioned tennis tournaments are listed in the annual schedule of the United States Lawn Tennis Association issued here today. Every section of the country is represented in the distribution of dates and indications point to one of the most successful seasons for the sport in the history of the organization.

Among the early season tournaments of importance in the Church Cup match to be played at Forest Hills, N. Y., May 21 and 22. Unusual interest is attached to this inter-city contest between New York, Boston and Philadelphia, because of the bearing it will have on the selection of the team to represent the United States abroad. As the team will sail early in June to enter the English championship and play Davis Cup ties in July, this will be the last important event before its members are chosen and the Davis Cup Committee will doubtless be guided in their selections by the showing made there.

An innovation is the change in the date of the intercollegiate championship which will be held June 23 instead of in September as heretofore. The women's national championship has been changed from June to September and will be played at Philadelphia, during the week beginning September 12. A new national event for women has been created in a separate tournament for the clay court titles which previously have been played with the men's events. This year the women's titles will be contested at the Detroit Tennis Club the week of June 21, while the men's events take place July 10 at Chicago. The men's championship of the United States is scheduled to begin August 30 at Forest Hills, N. Y.

All the sectional doubles tournaments are listed except the Intermountain event, covering Colorado and Utah which has not been arranged. These precede the national doubles championship at Longwood on August 16. The New York event has been awarded to the Crescent Athletic Club. A new event—an inter-city doubles match, has been awarded to Cleveland for July 21.

CROSS-CONTINENT RUN DUE TO START TODAY

SEATTLE, May 1.—Taking off from the federal building here, Ray A. Wilson, former marine, today was to start on a 3000 mile run.

Wilson's goal is New York. Running every foot of the distance, he hopes to reach there in 75 days. If he breaks into a walk at any time he forfeits any benefits arising from the race.

Wilson figures on making 41 miles a day, which would take him from coast to coast on the longest run in history in less than 11 weeks.

Arrangements have been made to have marathon stars along the route race against the continent-trotter. The last three miles—if he gets that far—will be a hot sprint with another star for a fat prize.

Wilson's backers say the first 40 or 50 miles are the hardest for him. Wilson's run was hastened by the announcement recently that S. Kanaguri, Japanese marathon champion, will try to run from New York to San Francisco after the Olympic games in Antwerp. The Jap's schedule calls for 30 days for the run, averaging 30 miles a day.

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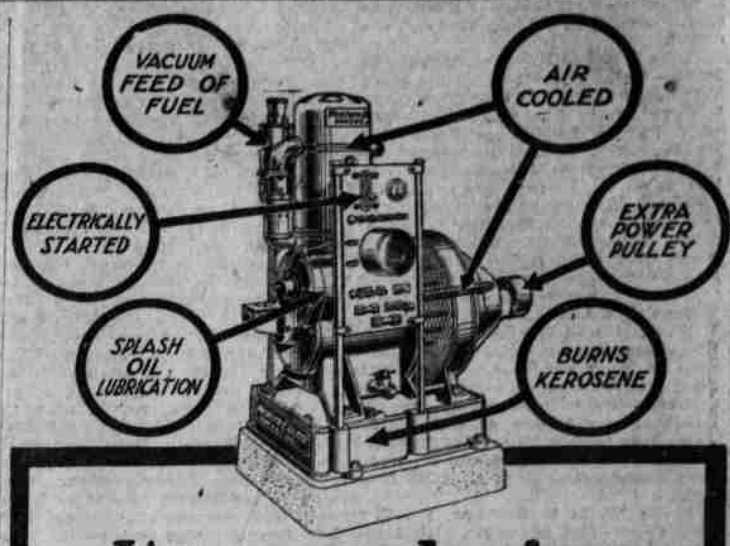
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
