LEGION POSTS PLEDGE AID TO 'BIG BROTHER' MOVEMENT IN KANSAS

(By Associated Press.) TOPEKA, May 4.—Twenty-eight American Legion posts in Kansas al-

ready have pledged their co-operation in the "big brother" plan inaugurated by Capt. William P. MacLean, superintendent of the state industrial school for boys here. When a boy is paroled by the institution, his name and essential facts concerning him are forwarded to the commander of the local post

in the city or town to which the boy is going. The commander appoints a Legion member to act as "big brother" to the boy. "Results have been excellent," said Captain MacLean. "These ex-service men give the paroled boys advice, help them find work, receive their reports from school, and in various ways aid them to make good." The plan has been endorsed by the state board of administration.

WARREN'S PATENT ON PAVEMENT TO EXPIRE

(By Associated Press.) SALEM, Or., May 4.—On Wednesday of this week the patent of the Warren Brothers company on bitulithic pavement, which has existed for 17 years will expire. Since early in 1919, in compliance with an act of the legislature the pavement has been laid in Oregon without the payment of royalty, on the assumption that the patent is not valid. The state has assumed responsibility for the royalty to protect contractors in the event the patent is upheld by the courts into which the question has been precipitated by the Warrens in a suit against Oscar Huber, an Oregon contractor, to collect royalty. The suit will serve as a test and all bitulithic pavement that has been laid from the spring of 1919 to the date of expiration of the patent will be involved aggregating about 1,100,000 yards. The company seeks to collect royalty at 20 cents a yard.
