**New Alarm Box Installed.**  
A new fire alarm box, to be known as No. 54, was installed today at the corner of Washington and Lincoln streets on the north side. The box is a part of the telegraph fire alarm system of the city.

**Three Take Knight Rank.**  
The rank of knight was conferred last night upon three candidates by the Knights of Pythias lodge in regular meeting. Those who took the degree work are: J. W. Sewell, James I. Phillips and Walter P. Russell.

**Services at S. A. Hall.**  
The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Big-nall of this city, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Davis, also of Pendleton, were Sunday dedicated to Christian services at the Salvation Army meeting. The ceremonies are a form of baptism and are for the purpose of consecrating the children. The names of the two babies are the first on the S. A. cradle roll.

**Miss Nason Buys Canteen.**  
Miss Sabra Nason, county librarian, has purchased the Red Cross canteen and will move it from the O. W. R. & N. depot grounds to a lot about a block from the county library on the north bank of the Umatilla River. Miss Nason will add improvements to the building and will use it for a residence.

**Class Will Hold Reunion.**  
The seventh annual reunion of the class of 1913, of Pendleton high school is to be held here on Saturday evening, May 8, it was announced today. Plans for the affair are in the hands of Miss Martha Hudeman and members of the class are expected to notify her of any suggestions they have for the gathering. Definite arrangements have not yet been made.

**Masonic Meeting Draws Many.**  
Ninety Masons attended the dinner and conferring of the master mason degree last evening in honor of the visiting members of the state supreme court, six of whom are members of the order. Will M. Peterson acted as toastmaster and toasts were responded to by the guests of honor as well as by several local masons. The master mason degree was conferred upon two men, Judge Henry Bean having charge of the work which took place after the supper was served.

The executive board of the Umatilla County Red Cross will meet on Thursday evening at the Red Cross rooms in the federal building. Important business is to be discussed.

**Commercial Club Tonight.**  
This is the evening for the regular monthly meeting of the Pendleton Commercial Club. The meeting is to come up before the session tonight and a good attendance is anticipated.

**Miss Counihan to Seattle.**  
Miss Helen Counihan, who has been employed by the Umatilla County Red Cross as instructor in Home Hygiene and care of the Sick, left today for Red Cross headquarters in Seattle. She has completed the hygiene instruction in Hermiston, Athens, Weston and Pendleton and has given examinations to the pupils.

**Permanent Bonds Arrive.**  
Permanent bonds of the second liberty loan, converted 4 1/2 per cent bonds, were received today by the American National Bank from the federal reserve bank at San Francisco. The permanent bonds contain all remaining coupons, up to and including the year 1942, when they are due for retirement. They are now available for exchange to persons who had the old four per cent bonds of the second loan.

**Trophy Cup on Display.**  
The silver cup which was presented to the Pendleton high school, for winning the track meet last Saturday, has been placed on exhibition in the school trophy room and makes a valuable addition to the already large collection of cups, banners etc. The boys hope to win several more at the Eastern Oregon track meet, a week from Saturday.

**Class Studies X-Ray Machine.**  
C. S. Cramer, science teacher at Pendleton high school, and his first period physics class visited Dr. Boyden's office this morning and inspected the x-ray machine there. A picture was taken of the bones in the hands and exhibited for the enlightenment of the others. The knowledge gained through the courtesy of the doctors is expected to aid materially in the study of the x-ray in class.

**Realty Board Meets.**  
The Umatilla County Realty Association held their regular meeting last night at the office of Snow & Dayton, with a very good attendance. Aside from general routine business the main subject was the housing problem in Pendleton, which seems to be a serious problem. Various plans were submitted, to be worked out at a later meeting. The next meeting of the Association will be held at a lunch at the Pendleton Hotel, on May 14, at one o'clock.

**Library Makes Record.**  
The circulation record at the Umatilla county library for March this year far exceeds all previous March records, according to a report issued by the library. The county and city total of 7,733 books circulated during the month is 27 per cent higher than during the month of March in 1919. In Pendleton alone the March circulation of 2,138 volumes read in the homes exceeded the 1919 total by 39 per cent. Never before, says the report, has the rural school circulation of 1,161 volumes taken into farm homes reached so high a figure for a single month.

**Jewett Will Not Accept.**  
Stanley Jewett, formerly of the city, and predatory animal inspector in Oregon, and Washington for the U. S. Biological Survey, will not accept an appointment to the position of State Biologist. Mr. Jewett was elected by the State Fish and Game Commission recently. In a statement to the commission, Mr. Jewett says that he intends to remain with the bureau, and besides his fight upon predatory animals, he will give some time to scientific investigation and other features. Mr. Jewett recently returned after a conference with biological survey officials in Washington, D. C.

**Congressional Candidate Here.**  
Rev. Owen F. Jones, of Baker, candidate for the republican nomination for congress in Pendleton today in the interests of his race for Congressman Sinnott's place. Mr. Jones formerly lived at Hermiston where he has some land and where he was in business for several years with the Columbia Mercantile Co. In 1914 he was a member of the republican executive committee in this state. Prior to coming to Oregon he resided in North Dakota and was a delegate to the state convention of that state. He also served as chaplain of the North Dakota senate. Mr. Jones is now a resident of Baker.

**TO REPORT POSTAL MEASURE.**  
WASHINGTON, May 4.—The house postoffice committee today voted to report the measure to repeal an automatic increase in postal rates on second class matter, scheduled to go into effect July 1. This action continues present rates which range from one and a half cents a pound for the first zone to five and a half for eight. Under the present legislation, rates for the eighth zone will be 10 cents July 1, with other zones increased accordingly.

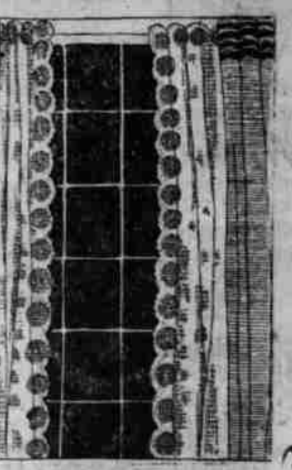

**FORCES STRUGGLE FOR POSSESSION OF KIEFF**

LONDON, May 4.—Russian soviet troops evacuated Kieff last Thursday, and retreated toward Kharkov, according to a Warsaw dispatch today. The Poles entered the city Sunday, the dispatch said, adding that they were welcomed by the people. Other dispatches said the fighting is still in progress in the region of Kieff.

WARSAW, May 3.—(Monday)—Bolsheviks are entrenching in the

hills on the west bank of the Dnieper in a great semi-circle, with their backs against Kiev, the Ukrainian capital, according to information today from the front. A fight for the possession of Kiev is at its height, raging day and night, along the line through valleys and rivers.
