A fine of \$10 was assessed in justice court today against a local auto owner, who gave the alias John Doe, for allowing his son to drive the machine. The youth in question is alleged under the age of 16 years. Complaint was made by Traffic Officer William Lyday.

The defendant complained about the plaintiff keeping a minor son by former marriage in their home and refused to pay dental bills, she alleges. Since 1916, the complaint says, the defendant has contributed virtually nothing to the plaintiff's support. She asks restoration of her former name, Ruth Royer. J. M. Schanep represents the plaintiff.

A marriage license was issued Saturday afternoon by the county clerk to Roy E. Grimes and Miss Thelma Eleanor Hoon, both of Freewater. The ceremony was performed in the east end town on Sunday.

**Woman Feared Bodily Injury**  
Julia C. LeBeau today brought suit for divorce from Joseph M. LeBeau, to whom she has been married since August, 1918. She charges cruelty. About a year ago at Perry the defendant rushed at her with a butcher knife, she alleges, and on May 4 started another attack on her which resulted in her leaving. She fears to return, she says. The couple has no children and no property to adjust. The plaintiff is represented by James A. Fee.

Louis Anderson and Frank Nelson, arrested last week at The Dalles for passing about \$50 worth of bad checks in Umatilla, were brought to the county jail here Saturday night by Sheriff T. D. Taylor, returning from Salem. They have not had a preliminary hearing as yet.

## SUPPORT OF LEGION IS ASKED FOR RELIEF BILL

The letter sent by State Commander Pollett to all American Legion Posts in Oregon, suggesting that the Posts not only endorse the Higher Education Relief bill but give their active support, has brought immediate results.

American Legion Posts at Bendleton, Albany, Salem, La Grande, Dallas, and other cities have already given endorsements.

Privates, non-coms, and officers alike discerned during the war the great value to themselves and to the country of college education, and as soon as the war was over 1500 of them enrolled at the University of Oregon, and the Oregon Agricultural College alone, while another large body went into the high schools and will appear at the higher education institutions next fall or later.

Under the terms of the State Aid Educational Act for soldiers, sailors and marines, the \$25 a month subsidy may be utilized at any time up to a maximum of \$290 a year for four years. Service men are accordingly taking an interest in seeing that the higher educational institutions of the state are protected by passage of the higher educational support bill, which provides 1.26 mills for the State University, Agricultural College and Oregon Normal School.

## WOMAN'S CLUB FAVORS EDUCATIONAL TAX BILL

The Woman's Club of Pendleton with the largest membership of any woman's club in the city, endorsed the higher educational tax measure and the elementary school tax measure at a recent meeting. Both measures will come before the people for vote May 21. Following is the resolution passed by the club:

With the world endeavoring to recover its equilibrium following the greatest war in history, one fundamental principle never to be lost sight of is that education must be strengthened, so that social, industrial and political problems may be adjusted in accord with fairness and intelligence.

Whereas, in Oregon several educational measures of great merit are upon the ballot at the primary election to be held May 21; one of these measures is destined to save higher educational institutions from the necessity of closing their doors upon hundreds, if not thousands, of deserving students; another measure known as the elementary school bill, seeks to help distribute the burden of paying for common school education so that much property now exempt from taxation for this purpose shall be made to bear its just share of the load.

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Pendleton Woman's Club earnestly endorse both the higher educational tax act, the elementary school tax measure and all other educational bills upon the ballot at the primary election.

And be it further resolved, that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the state school superintendent at Salem, Oregon, and also to Dr. J. W. Kerr, chairman of the joint collegiate campaign committee, 514 Pittock Block, Portland, Oregon.
