Education Sunday Is May 16.

The churches of the state are to devote a portion of their services next Sunday to the two educational tax measures before the people of the state May 21. All ministers in this county have been asked to speak in favor of the higher educational relief tax and the elementary school tax. The proclamation was made from the office of J. A. Churchill state superintendent of public instruction.

New Equipment Installed

Two new picture machines of the latest improved type have been installed by Greulich and Matlock at the Alta theatre. The machines are Simplex 1920 models and are considered the most up-to-date in the market. Similar machines are operated in the Coliseum at Seattle, and the Liberty and Majestic in Portland. The Pastime and Arcade theatres here also have similar machines. Mr. Matlock says that these machines give to Pendleton patrons the best in projection that money can buy.

Interest Is Growing.

Ex-service men in the county are showing a growing interest in the M. C. A. educational service for former members of the army, navy and Marines, according to Cash Wood, county Y secretary. Mr. Wood explains that the service is entirely free and either resident courses in accredited schools, or correspondence courses are available. Recent advances from the head offices indicate that the awards of the free scholarships should be made at once in order to comply with the conditions. Men desiring to take such courses next month sign up this month in order for the plan to become effective. Inquiry at the local Y. M. C. A. office, Despain building, will give further details.

Chairman Says Whole Week.

N. J. Blydenstein, chairman of the Pendleton Commercial Association committee in charge of Oregon Products Week, said today that the entire week of June 14 to 19 would be utilized for the displays, as requested by the Associated Industries of Oregon. Lists will be circulated among local merchants later this week asking them to sign for the entire week and agree to display Oregon-made goods in their windows during that time. Those who do not care to sign for the whole week will not be pressed to give any of their space during the week, the chairman said. Only one large store has raised objection to the plan of devoting the longer time.

Paving Laid in County

Between April 1, 1917, when the state highway commission had its inception, and April 30, 1929, there was laid in Umatilla county 47 miles of paving; 59.3 miles of macadam, and 49.7 miles of grading, according to a report issued by the commission. The estimated cost is \$1,517,426.56, with the state's share \$745,551.56, the county's share \$555,486.51, and the government's share \$216,388.49. The report shows that the total paving in Oregon was approximately 430 miles, with 448 miles of macadam, and grading totalling 988 miles. The total estimated cost throughout the state for these improvements was \$25,312,759.46, of which the state paid \$13,811,058.55. Contributions of counties amounted to \$2,634,595.10, while the government's share of the total expense was \$9,667,105.81.

Convention to Be in Burns.

Local stockmen are planning to attend the seventh annual Cattle and Horse Raisers' Association, to be held in Burns May 24 and 25. While there will be no special rates from Pendleton, a special train will run from Ontario to Crane on Sunday, May 23, at 10:45 a. m. for the accommodation of persons attending the convention. Pendleton people will be able to connect with the train by taking No. 4 upon its arrival here on Sunday at 1:15 a. m. Among subjects to be discussed at the convention are "The Use of Slugs," "Some of the Reasons for Federal Taxes," "The Grazing Regulations," "Household Remedies for Range Diseases," "The General Future of the Stock Business," "Beef Cattle in Oregon," "Investment Shows," "Possibilities of Co-operative Disposal of Beef by Producers" and "Winter Rations for Calves and Yearlings."
