NEWS OF THE COUNTY OFFICES AND OFFICERS

Four Road Graders Working.

The county now has four crews at work with road graders repairing damage done by floods during the winter and spring. Good progress is reported, although not all parts of the county have been reached. The county has been handicapped in its work by the shortage of labor. Farmers who formerly were able to assist in road work are short handed this year and are unable to assist with the work. The county is endeavoring to put in shape as many as possible of the main traveled roads before the ground gets too dry for road work.

Former Owner Sues Newspaper.

J. P. McManis, formerly publisher of the Pendleton Tribune, this afternoon brought suit against the Tribune Co., present publishers, for \$1884.10, and interest, alleged due him. The sum of \$1884.10 remains unpaid on account, he alleges, and there are notes of \$500 and \$300, respectively, signed on April 25, 1914, outstanding, on which he asks judgment. The plaintiff is represented in the action by Raley, Raley & Stelwer and H. J. Warner.

New Ford Car Stolen.

A virtually new Ford touring car belonging to Fred A. Frazier was stolen from its garage on Post street some time last night. Mr. Frazier reported to the sheriff this afternoon. He did not miss the machine until this noon. No clue as to the thief or thieves is held. The machine bore Oregon license No. 72968 and its motor number is 2567237. It is a self starter model. The owner posted \$50 for the capture of the thieves and return of the machine.

Judgment on Notes Asked.

W. C. E. Pruitt today brought suit against Joseph Craig to collect two notes, given by the defendant. The first sum asked is \$123.29 and the second \$101.60. Interest and attorney fees are asked. Peterson, Bishop & Clark represent the plaintiff.

Judge and Sheriff Return.

Judge G. W. Phelps returned from Heppner this morning with Sheriff T. D. Taylor in the latter's car. Judge Phelps came back to await the completion of work by the Morrow county grand jury before holding a term of court in Heppner. Sheriff Taylor was called to Heppner yesterday to testify before the grand jury. That body has several days' work ahead of it and several matters in circuit court here this week can be taken care of.

Krause and Moore, it is said, have been working on sheep ranches in the south of the county for some time, and if so, probably would be considered eligible to play in the league. Helix understands the agreement between the teams to mean that no importation of ball players be allowed during the race.

The game Sunday was called off by the president when Milton telephoned and inquired about the weather. At 1 o'clock in the afternoon the rain ceased and had there been a team here, the game could have been played. It is possible that the postponed game will be scheduled for Sunday.

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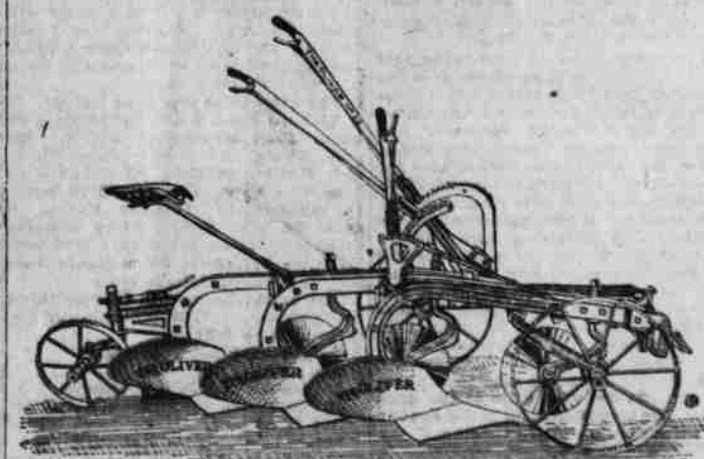

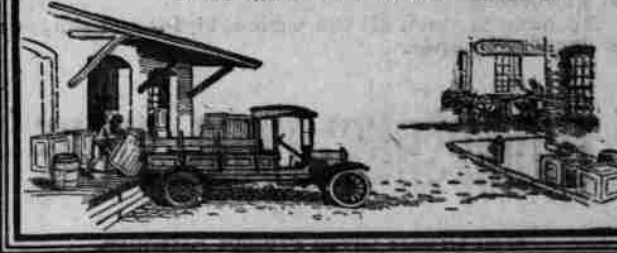
