PLANKS RECOGNIZING FARMERS ARE URGED

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, May 13.—Recognition for farmers will be asked of the platform makers of each of the two great political parties at their June conventions by Representatives of farm organizations of the country. This action was decided on yesterday at the closing session of the national board of farm organizations' meeting.

According to Charles A. Lyman, national secretary of the board, it was the general opinion of the delegates that the food producers of the country never had received the attention of either the republican or the democratic party to which they were entitled. It was their purpose, he said, to send representatives to the Chicago and the San Francisco conventions with demands that they be recognized in the formation of party platforms and to throw the weight of their support at the November election to that party which gave the greatest consideration to the farmer in the party declaration of principles.

WOMEN ALONE WILL GUIDE TOWN'S DESTINY

(By Associated Press.) CHEYENNE, May 13.—Jackson, Wyo., claims to have the distinction of being the first city in the world which will be governed entirely by women. At Tuesday's city election there were two tickets in the field, one composed of women candidates and the other of men. The women won by a vote of two to one, after a campaign in which the only issue was the question of sex.

One of the women candidates for councilman, Mrs. Rose Crabtree, defeated her husband, Henry Crabtree. Jackson is in the community about which Owen Winter wrote in "The Virginian." It has a population of about 700 and is said to be one of the most isolated towns in the country. It lies south of Yellowstone National park and is surrounded by high mountains. The nearest railroad point is at least 75 miles from Jackson.

HINES WILL ARBITRATE DISPUTE ON NAVIGATION

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 13.—Walker D. Hines, who resigned Saturday as director-general of railroads, has been selected by the president to be the arbitrator between various European countries concerned in questions affecting navigation on the Danube, Rhine, Oder, Elbe and other rivers of central Europe, the full resumption of navigation is dependent upon the determination to be made. Interruption of navigation on the Danube has affected economic conditions in the Balkans and neighboring states.

An arbitrator to be named by the United States is provided for in the German, Austrian and Bulgarian treaties, although no commitments toward these treaties on the part of the United States was involved, it was said.

DRYS URGE ADOPTION OF PROHIBITION PLANKS

CHICAGO, May 12.—A nation-wide appeal was issued by the prohibitionist national committee today urging drys to rally to the support of the party in forcing conventions of the major parties to adopt dry planks in their platforms. Charging that the vets are making a hard drive to repeal the Volstead act and nullify the eighteenth amendment, Chairman Hinshaw of the prohibition national committee, stated the situation to be serious and that it is up to prohibitionists, to take quick and drastic action to crush the wet drive.

He urges churches, Sunday schools, young peoples societies, young men's and women's clubs, fraternal societies, commercial clubs, labor unions, granges etc., to adopt resolutions demanding that both republican and democratic conventions include dry planks in their platforms.

LOANS FOR SOLDIERS PROPOSED BY BORAH

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 12.—Soldier relief legislation departing radically from proposals before the house was introduced in the senate by Senator Borah today. It proposes to make available \$300,000,000 during the next 10 years for loans to all honorably discharged men.

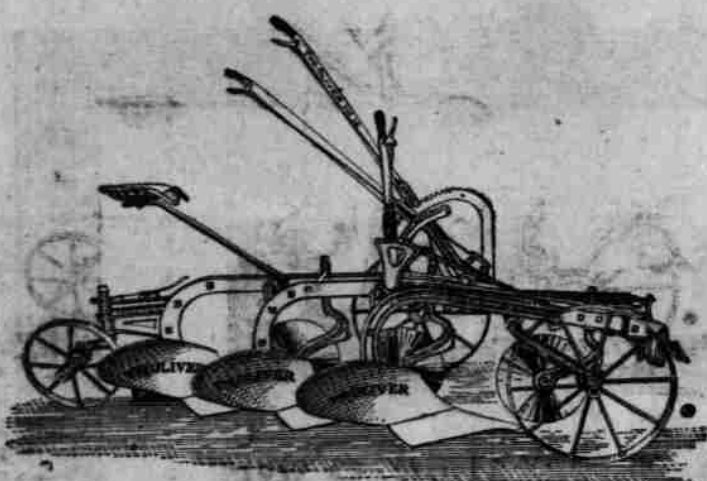
