PRESBYTERIANS MAY BALLOT ON ADMITTING WOMEN TO PULPIT

(By United Press.) PHILADELPHIA, May 21.—The privilege of admitting women to ordination as ruling elders will be submitted to referendum vote of the entire Presbyterian Church throughout the United States if the recommendation of the commission especially appointed to investigate the matter is approved by the Presbyterian General Assembly, which opened its official annual sessions in Philadelphia last night. The commission on the official relation of women in the church consists of Rev. S. Hall Young, Chairman, New York; Rev. Edgar W. Work, New York; Rev. William L. Barrett, Bellefontaine, Ohio; John T. Manson, New Haven, Conn.; and Rush Tappan, New York. It has been investigating the subject for the past year. It canvassed the opinion of leading ministers, elders and women of the Presbyterian Church.

Scriptures Searched This survey showed that the Scriptures did not forbid either women elders or women preachers; that three other denominations ordain women to the ministry but few women avail themselves of the privilege; that four other denominations did not have women preachers and are not inclined to have them; that the evidence shown is favorable to women as elders but unfavorable to women as ministers; that of the Presbyterians canvassed sixty per cent favored women as elders, forty-eight and one-half per cent opposed any change in the present usage of the church.

The General Assembly of 1919 received three overtures; one from the Presbytery of Columbia River asked that women be made eligible to ordination both as ministers and ruling elders; the Presbytery of Saginaw, Mich., asked that they be ordained as ruling elders; and the Presbytery of Dallas, Texas, asked that a committee be appointed to investigate the whole question of enlarged opportunities for women in the Church.

PARIS, May 21.—Hungary will sign the treaty of peace, President Prazmowski, of the Hungarian peace delegation, notified the supreme council today. He just returned from Budapest.

31 WIN-CERTIFICATES IN NURSING COURSE

Thirty-one Unatilla county women have won certificates in Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick, as the result of completing the course given by Miss Helen Sonnhlan, Red Cross nurse. The average grade received by the pupils, the examination papers show, was 95 per cent. Miss Lotys L. Davis of Hermiston and Mrs. Adele Goff McEwen of Athens, scored 100 per cent. The Unatilla county Red Cross, under whose auspices the instruction was given, are well pleased with the results of the classes and with the work of Miss Sonnhlan. (Continued from page 1.) months, has been improved and the old ruins at one corner have been made into a plaza and tennis court. The Filipino, Chinese and Spanish stores as well as all church buildings, etc., inside the walled city are just as old and there is nothing to indicate any change, except the smell, or rather the absence thereof. We motored over practically all the ground that was covered by the 2nd Oregon in 1898. Malabon has not changed and there was no trouble in picking out the very ground over which we charged to take the insurgents' trenches. All the trenches are gone except in one small spot. The old ditch that we crossed with the water up to our arm pits, was still there. A small Filipino cemetery is now located about where Sergeant West was wounded. The bamboo thicket facing the Swamp where Sergeant West was wounded, looks the same as ever. We followed the old course on up through Malinta, Marilao, Borneo, etc., and covered in a day the same territory that we campaigned over for several weeks. It would be tiresome for me to go into detail further, and more than to say that we visited the spot near Paial where Al Carden was "plugged" through the lung with a mauer bullet. There is a rock quarry there now but there was no trouble locating the spot. Mrs. Hartman seemed to enjoy fighting the battles with us. We were accompanied on most all our trips by Major Eastwick and Captain Heath and his wife. Eastwick is manager of the American & Foreign Banking Corporation and Heath is in the hemp business. He also has a cattle ranch on one of the southern islands. The Co. D boys will be interested to know that John Gaffney recently sold his mine in the Icorrote district for about \$100,000. I didn't see him, but I met the governor of the province who gave me information. Icard has been in Shanghai for several years. When I started this letter I intended to write politically but I find that it is wide of that subject but it would not be appropriate to close without expressing in very strong terms the sentiment of the Americans, which is that the Filipinos are absolutely incapable of self-government. There are many highly educated and competent natives but as a class they are not. How long have we been educating the Indians? Do you think they could take over our state or national government? Governor General Harrison seems to be a joke and yet the Filipinos are lanning to elect him for U. S. president. Cordially, A. HARTMAN.

WEST END PEOPLE ARE WORRIED OVER APPLES

Considerable apprehension is felt by the fruit growers of the West End by the county as the apple blossoms are dropping from the trees, which, if it continues, means an entire failure of the crop this year. Some who have made a study of the raising of fruit, are of the opinion that the condition may be the cause of lack of pollenation in the orchards as this happens where there is not enough variety of fruit. Still others are of the opinion that the severe weather of the past winter damaged the trees to a certain extent yet the blossoms formed, but lack of sap weakened the growth, not allowing the fruit to form and mature. The latter idea is the more plausible one as this condition seems to exist where the pollenation is perfect. The winter killing of peach trees throughout the country was a very unfortunate loss to many and now the failure of apples, when hopes were entertained for a bumper crop, is felt keenly by those who make fruit raising their main industry and the shortage will be noticed in other places, the fruit trees in this practically new country were coming into their own, being old enough to begin bearing well and carloads would be shipped from this end of the county, as was done last year, when the best crop in the history of this section was harvested. Some fear it is felt that the trees may die within another year as this occurs in fruit sections after very cold winters. Belief will be held by optimists that this will not be true however.

OMAHA TO BECOME BASE DEPOT FOR 500 PLANES

OMAHA, Neb., May 21.—Omaha is to become within two years a base depot for 500 mail planes, according to Col. J. L. Jordan, chief of construction and extension of the air mail service. Each of the planes to be used in the New York-San Francisco mail service and the radiating branches is to be so constructed that within a day it could be transformed into a fighting aircraft, he said. "In case of trouble a battle plane converted how could reach coast or border in from 15 to 20 hours," he added. Col. Jordan, who is on an inspection tour of landing fields, predicted that within a year mail will be transported from coast to coast in 24 hours. The plans contemplate that, he said.
