OUTRAGES AGAINST GERMANS ALLEGED

BERLIN, May 21.—The government has abundant proof of outrages by French negro troops in the occupied zone against German women and children, Adolf Koestler, foreign minister, told the reichstag today. "The final aim of the French policy," he said "is to be the ruin of Germany, mentally and physically." He demanded that France begin her disarmament by first disarming her negro soldiers. A stormy debate developed, radical members refusing to join in the protest against any special race or nation.

Calls Wave of Luxury Buying in U. S. "Dance of Industrial Death"



In a letter sent to members of the National Association of Credit Men, J. H. Tregoe, secretary-treasurer of the organization, called the present wave of luxury buying in the United States "The Dance of Industrial Death." He added: "The nation is sound fundamentally and the soundness will continue if people will give up their folly, become diligent and work as human beings should work during a time of stress and strain."

MACCABEE DRIVE MAY BRING HEADQUARTERS

The membership drive for the Maccabees which opens here Monday is endorsed by the Pendleton Commercial Association, in the hope of securing enough members to make Pendleton the headquarters for the new lodge district, comprising all territory east of the Cascades to Boise, Idaho and from California to the Washington line. Nixon N. Christy, district commander for the lodge, will be in charge of the drive. He states that the contest for the location of headquarters lies between Pendleton and La Grande, which has 500 more members than has Pendleton. Should Pendleton become headquarters, the annual district convention would be held here; all district officers would be located here; a local bank would be designated for the keeping of the funds of the district, and the Maccabees district convention would be erected here. Attorneys in charge of the Griffith estate, which has been estimated to be worth as much as \$3,000,000, said that her marriage to naval officers would not affect her rights and that she and her two small children would inherit the entire estate. Mr. and Mrs. Griffith had been separated for several years and she had instituted an action for divorce which, however, was not pressed.
