Rainfall Below Normal
May's rainfall was far below normal, according to the month's report made by Major Lee Moorhouse, official weather observer. The rainfall was .32 inches, while the normal is 1.47. The hottest day was on May 7, when the mercury rose to 87, while the coldest weather was on the night of May 26, when the temperature went to 32, freezing point. Twenty-seven days were clear, one was cloudy and three were partly cloudy.

Former Local Man Dies
Edward H. Eggers, aged 29, formerly a resident of Pendleton and a brother of Mrs. W. A. Rhodes of this city, died Sunday at Perham, Minnesota. Mr. Eggers left here about four months ago. He had been in poor health for some time. He is survived by his parents and three brothers, besides Mrs. Rhodes. Mrs. Rhodes accompanied by little Billy Rhodes, left yesterday for Perham to attend the funeral.

Tri-State Club Has Secretary.

Assault Case in Court.
M. E. Brothers was fined \$5 in police court this morning for assault, the charge having been preferred by Charles Barnett, proprietor of the Alta house. The altercation is alleged to have resulted over a telephone message. Brothers told the court that after he hit Barnett, the latter reached for his hip pocket and that he lost no time getting out of the way when that move was made. He was adjudged guilty after a trial in which City Attorney Fee appeared for the prosecution. Brothers did not employ an attorney.

Stack Up Wheat Situation
The wheat crop in Umatilla county today is in really better shape than it was on June 1 last year, in the estimation of David H. Nelson, who has just looked over a considerable area of wheat in the county. Mr. Nelson says the condition is between 10 and 20 per cent of normal and that with a good month of June, an excellent crop will result. The color and quality of the plants now is good, he says, and a lot depends upon the moisture to be obtained this month. Mr. Nelson returned last week from his holdings in Montana and says that prospects there are also very much better than for a number of years. Last year an almost complete crop failure was recorded in that state but there has been plenty of moisture this spring and there is not the danger of a water shortage as was experienced last summer.

COMPETITIVE WAGE IN AGRICULTURE URGED

NEW YORK, June 1.—The need of making agricultural wages competitive with city wages and the necessity of the government to find a means of importing fertilizer at a price that American farmers will pay for it, were emphasized yesterday in reports made

public by subcommittees of the republican national committee's advisory committee on policies and platform. It is planned to submit the suggestions in the platform committee of the republican national convention at Chicago. The sub-committee reporting on

agriculture, of which United States Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas, was chairman, urged that a national commission be appointed to coordinate all rail water and motor transport with adequate facilities for receiving, handling and transporting food between cities. This commission, it was said, would render a great national good
