PENDLETON TOSSERS PROVE FIRST SNARE FOR TWIN CITY NINE

Buckaroos Hand Out First Defeat of Year to Milton-Freewater Bunch in 11 to 9 Contest at Round-Up Park.

Pendleton proved a stumbling block to the aspirations of the Milton-Freewater nine at Round-Up park yesterday, winning an 11 to 9 out game by a 11 to 9 score. Pendleton had two big innings and the losers, one, in which a total of 15 runs out of the 26 made during the matinee, were accounted for.

Milton started out like it would put the game on ice with the first man up, Hamlin, who pitched and also leads the batting order, put one of Williams' first offerings over into the center field barrel stand for a home run. No more damage resulted in this inning but in the second Garber doubled to left and was thrown out at third by Hays.

Hays Starts First Score.

Hays started the Bucks on their first score by singling with one away in the second. Olson couldn't advance him so Rooney stole second. Ammon hit one that took a bad hop over Garber's head, scoring Hays with the tying run. Ammon stole and went to the run on a passed ball, where he died, when Murphy went out to first.

Milton came back with two runs in the third but Pendleton in their half put over six. Williams walked, Newton beat out a bunt and went to second on a wild throw that put Williams on third. Miles singled, bringing both men in. Peterson doubled to left and Miles pulled up on third. Crews singled over first, scoring Miles. Hays singled to center and brought Peterson over. Hays stole second, with Crews on third. Olson got life at first on an error. Crews scored. Best then went into the box for the east enders and Hamlin went to right. After the side had batted around, Murphy, Williams and Newton ended the inning by whiffing.

Score Four in Sixth.

In the sixth inning Pendleton finished its scoring by picking up four runs on four hits. Miles started out by garnering his third hit of the day and stealing. Hays, Ammon and Miller interspersed hits with Milton errors and the four runs trickled across.

The seventh was Milton's big inning five runs counting. Best was out when Hamlin singled through short. Everett was safe on an error by Peterson. Clark tripled to left, counting two. Duff got life on another error and Bridgewater singled. Before the last man was out, Hamlin, Everett, Clark, Bridgewater and Crimmins had counted. There was no further scoring.

Errors Are Pivotal.

Both teams looked poor in the field at times, due partly to the rough infield and partly to plain poor judgment. Williams pitched a good game and with tight support, as in Sunday's game, would have held Milton down to a low score. The losers used three twirlers against the locals, who had their hitting clothes on, along with their occasional hobble in the field. A big crowd from the east end came down to see their boys lose for the first time.

BUBONIC PLAGUE HAS ATTACKED VERA CRUZ; 5 OF 11 VICTIMS DIE

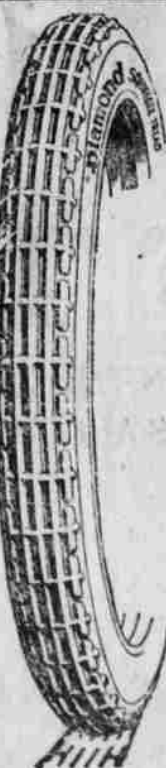

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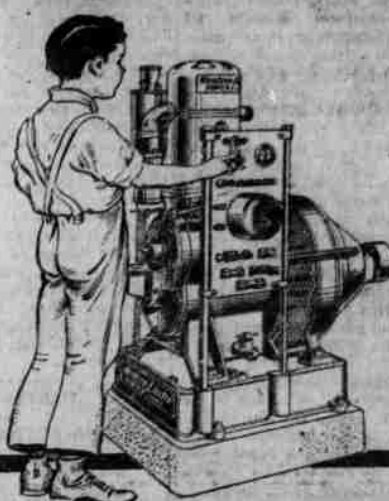
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
