SEATTLE, June 7.—Something of a thrill and excitement of old gold rush days was recalled yesterday when the steamer Victoria, veteran of the northern route, sailed from Seattle on the first trip of the season to Nome.

A crowd that overflowed several piers gathered at the water front to bid a goodbye to the Victoria's 500 passengers, and numerous farewell levees were held at the last moment.

Under normal conditions the Victoria should reach Nome June 12, but ship's officers said the arrival would be considerably delayed by the presence of ice in Bering Sea. A message received from Nome today said a lead had opened in the ice fields and that a thaw was in progress.

SEATTLE, June 7.—Payment of fair wages to employees in the federal civil service was recommended as a remedy for conditions in that service characterized as "chaotic" in a report just made public of a subcommittee on civil service and retirement of the republican committee's advisory committee on policies and platform.
