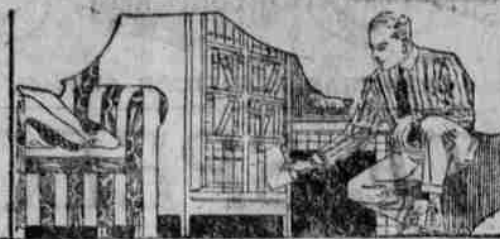

FIVE AMERICANS ARE ELIMINATED AT GOLF

(By Associated Press.)

MURFIELD, Scotland, June 8.—Five of the American golfers entered in the English Amateur championship tournament which began Monday were eliminated in the opening round.

A. J. F. Byers of Pittsburgh, United States champion in 1926, was defeated by G. C. Manford, Liffness, five and four; G. H. Walker of St. Louis lost to A. E. Phillips, Porters Park, 3 and 2, and D. W. Smyth, County Down, defeated F. S. Douglas of New York, United States champion in 1925, three and two.

F. S. Wheeler did not win a hole in his match against Capt. K. P. Carter of the Royal Port Rush Club, Ireland. S. G. Suckney of Clayton, Mo., was the first American played to win. He

defeated Bertrand Bannerman of Telverton, seven and five. In another first round match F. C. Newton of New York finished all square on the home green, but his opponent, P. Caldwell Ker, beat him, playing the extra hole and won 1 up (12 holes).

YOUNG CHINA PHEASANTS WILL BE TURNED LOOSE

(By Associated Press.)

SEATTLE, Wash., June 8.—To replenish the supply of Chinese pheasants in woods throughout the state, the state game farm at Walla Walla will commence shipment of 6-week old "chicks" to county game commissions next week. L. H. Darwin, state game commissioner, announced today. The first shipments Dr. Darwin said, will be to western Washington coun-

ties. About 5,000 in all will be sent out during the summer. About 200 young mallard ducks are also available for distribution, Mr. Darwin said.

NORTHWEST LEAGUERS WILL AID WEAK CLUBS

(By Associated Press.)

TACOMA, Wash., June 8.—Officials and directors of the Pacific International League met here Monday. President Louis H. Barnett reported that while it was one of the most successful meetings the directors have yet held little of interest to the fan was accomplished. Most of the business consisted of pooling the holiday receipts, attending to the transportation bills and see that each club was withing the salary and player limit. Some of the managers indicated that one or

two of the clubs were over the limit. The directors voted to stand behind any of the weaker teams and strengthen them at their own expense if necessary. That the Seattle Club will be strengthened shortly was indicated and an announcement or two of real imports to the Seattle backers was promised inside of a week.

BUREAU WILL EMPLOY AN ASSISTANT AGENT

An assistant county agriculture agent is to be employed by the Umatilla County Bureau to aid Fred Bennion, according to a recent decision of the bureau's executive board.

The duties of the assistant will be confined largely to distributing to farmers distillate ordered through the farm bureau, and his salary will be paid by charging a half to one cent for delivery of each gallon. Twelve cars of distillate or 160,661 gallons were recently delivered to 111 county farmers at an estimated saving of \$5,000, and an additional 80,000 gallons is soon to be distributed to 100 farmers who did not receive any from the first shipments. The executive committee states that because of such a saving, the bureau can well afford to employ an assistant for Mr. Bennion. Mr. Bennion has been forced to give practically all his time to arranging for distribution of gas, but with the employment of an assistant he will be able to look after other activities of the agent's office, such as sulphur demonstrations, weed control, etc.

O. A. C. has been asked to supply the assistant as soon as possible. It is probable that a man who is in training as a county agent will be sent. Besides his duties in distributing the distillate, the assistant will give general help to Mr. Bennion in other lines of county agent and farm bureau work.

be so services there tonight, in compliance with the city's edict. Efforts are now being made to find another location for the tent, but it is hinted that even should the evangelists locate within the city they will find difficulty getting another permit. The permit under which they were holding meetings was ordered revoked by the council at the session.

Leaders of the evangelists yesterday evening took their case to a local attorney but so far have taken no definite action towards retaining their tent within the city.

Action against the tent was not alone due to the Edward Rue incident, in which he is alleged to have gone insane from attending the meetings. Complaints of excessive noise in the tent late at night were made by residents of that vicinity and the council previously informed the worshippers that they would have to be more orderly.

The evangelists are complaining that officers of the law should dictate by whose conscience they would worship and deny that Mr. Rue has gone insane, it is said by city officials. He has merely "heard the call," one of the number is reported to have said.
