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PROTESTED GAME WON BY MILTON-FREEWATER FROM BEARS TO STAND

League Directors, at Meeting Here, Decide to Play Off Postponed Games and Settle on Umpire Question.

Milton-Freewater's victory over the Walla Walla Bears on the Milton diamond three weeks ago stands as a regular win, by decision of the directors of the Blue Mountain league in season here yesterday afternoon. The score was 4 to 3 in favor of the east end team.

Arrangements were made to have Pilot Rock meet Milton-Freewater at Milton before the end of the season to play off their postponed game from May 30. The Pilot Rock boys were unable to make the trip on account of the gas shortage. The game may affect the Twin City's chances for the pennant and the directors decided it should be played.

No man on the umpire staff hereafter shall officiate in a game in which his home town is playing, the directors decided. There was no complaint made as a basis for this action, but expediency in leaving no openings for complaint was responsible.

GREECE, AFTER LONG WAR PERIOD, TO PUT TEAM INTO OLYMPICS

Nation That Founded Athletics to Try Comeback as Champion of Minor League at Games This Summer.

ATHENS, June 8.—Greece, back on a more or less peace basis after eleven years of wars and revolution, hopes to head the minor league at the Antwerp Olympic games.

As the first step toward regaining the athletic supremacy she once enjoyed, Greece will use American training methods for her team, under the supervision of Director A. E. Marriott, of the American Y. M. C. A. physical department at Athens, and a crop of American assistants brought from the United States especially for that purpose.

King Alexander is active head of the committee preparing the Greek athletes for the games. The government has appropriated 250,000 drachmas (\$4,250) for the team's support, and is ready to give more if necessary.

Until this year, athletics had been practically forgotten in Greece since 1909, because of war. Following the 1909 peaceful revolution, with consequent upheavals in political life, Greece became a participant in the Balkan wars of 1912 and 1913. Then with the outbreak of the European war, she was in a delicate position, until her entry as one of the allied belligerents in 1917. Ever since the armistice the Greeks have been active against the Turks in the Smyrna district.

Effort at Comeback Under the conditions, many Greeks believed Greece would have been justified in declining to compete in the Olympics, but participation was made a point of honor. From the King downward, the attempt at a "come back" was started in order to remain the world that Greece not only originated and developed athletic games, but instituted the Olympics.

King Alexander became sponsor for the team, and the invitation to compete was accepted. The committee on the Olympic games and the Federation of Athletic and Gymnastic Association—the two authoritative athletic organizations—undertook to train the team. The Olympic Committee formed an executive committee, headed by the King, of which specialists in all branches of athletics are members—even the Y. M. C. A.'s physical director. The executive committee familiarized all athletes and athletic organizations with the work to be done to form an Olympic team.

A suggestion by the Y. M. C. A. that the team be trained under American conditions was accepted. Over a month ago the conditioning prospective members of the team was begun at the stadium. All athletes are enthusiastic over the methods. Director Marriott obtained the King's permission to try out members of the Royal Guard—the picked men of the entire Greek army—for the team, and found much excellent material.

The entire army, as a matter of fact is expected to contribute to the team, as athletics were introduced some months ago in all organizations.

General Outlook Hopeful Taking into consideration the continual mobilization of the Greek forces for the past ten years, the Olympic outlook is hopeful. Greece is confident of excellent representation, and though not expecting victory over the great athletic nations of America and Europe, does expect to be among the leaders of the second division.

Because of the necessity of practically recommencing athletics in Greece, the formation of the actual Olympic team has not been started. Early in June, special games will be held for the selection of team members. This plan was adopted at the suggestion of Morcos Minder, president of the Federation of Greek Athletic and Gymnastic Associations, who was one of a few prominent men whose support made possible the maintenance of athletics during the years of war.

The greatest advantage the Greek athletes will have at the games is that of tradition. All Greeks are prospective athletes, burning with desire to be worthy of their ancestors, who taught the world the rudiments of athletics. There is every confidence that even in the first year of their rejuvenation the Greek athletes will uphold the national reputation for athletic proficiency.

JUDGE WILL NOT GIVE CHICAGO CLUB VERDICT

CINCINNATI, O., June 8.—Motion for a directed verdict in favor of the defendant was overruled Monday by Federal Judge J. W. Pack at the conclusion of the testimony of Lee Magee, who is suing the Chicago National League baseball club for salary he claims is due him and for breach of contract.

James Costello, Boston, Mass., billiard hall proprietor, was the star witness for the defense. Christy Mathewson, manager of the Reds during the season of 1918, also was a witness for the defense.

Magee, his own witness, gave testimony relating largely to his professional career.

TUNNEY KNOCKS OUT MADDERN IN ROUND 12

The club physician examined Madden's jaw after the bout and said he believed a bone had broken. Tunney weighed 177 pounds and Madden 179. Young Chancey of Baltimore out-fought Tommy Noble of England in all but one round of a 12-round bout.

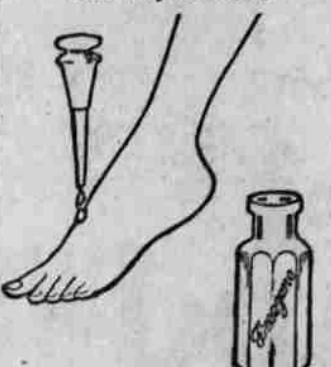

The qualifying rounds end tomorrow.

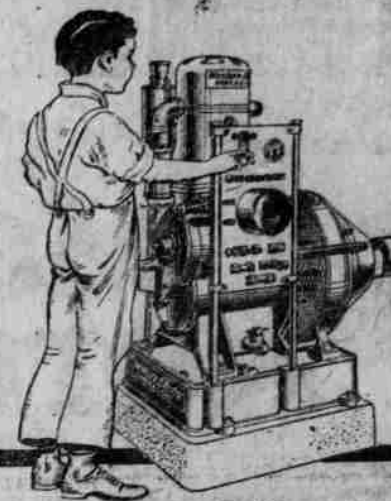
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
