# THREE KILLED MAY INJURED BY SANTA FE WRECK; JACK DEMPSEY IS ACQUITTED

## BROKEN CRANK ON BIG ENGINE CAUSES SMASH

Fifty Injured in "California Limited" Near Reno, Colorado, Early This Morning. Four Coaches Go Off Track.

## AID IS RUSHED FROM LA HUNTA, COLORADO

One Woman Among Injured Died Following Wreck; Two Relief Trains Are Sent to Scene of Catastrophe Today.

LA JUNTA, June 15.—Two persons were killed and 50 injured today near Reno, Colorado, when an east-bound Santa Fe train, the "California Limited" was wrecked. Relief trains carrying doctors and nurses have been despatched to the scene. A broken crank on an engine caused the wreck, according to information reaching here. Four coaches left the track.

Say 3 Killed

LA JUNTA, Colo., June 15.—Three were killed and several probably fatally injured in the wreck of a Santa Fe passenger train near here. Over thirty passengers were injured. One woman who was injured died. Two relief trains with virtually all La Junta doctors and nurses went to the scene.

## JOHN DAY PROJECT LOOKS TO RECLAMATION OF GREAT EMPIRE IN THIS SECTION

First of a Series of Articles Being Written for the East Oregonian by E. P. Dodd.

Since the big Boardman Barbecue much live interest has been awakened in the John Day Irrigation Project. For 15 years the John Day Project has been on the map of Oregon but Mr. and Mrs. General Public have known little more about it than they do of the great canals on the moon. They have heard of it but it was none of their business and not until a new community had established itself on the edge of that tremendous enterprise the aforesaid Mr. and Mrs. Public were awakened to a sense of their responsibility and opportunity.

## SELF SUFFICIENCY OF OREGON EVIDENCED IN LOCAL DISPLAYS BY MERCHANTS ALL THIS WEEK

Handiwork of Workmen, Mills and Farms of State Assembled in Most Instructive Displays Ever Seen Here.

The handiwork of Oregon workmen, Oregon manufacturers and of Oregon agriculture are combined today in a myriad of displays which occupy one or more windows in nearly every progressive business house in Pendleton. Goods made south of the Columbia, west of the Snake, east of the Pacific and north of California and Nevada are getting their week of undivided attention this week.

Pendleton products by no means are subordinate to those of the other towns of Oregon. Virtually all products of this city is being shown in one or more windows and in tastefully arranged displays. Local flour and by products, perhaps, share honors with the wooden goods of the Pendleton Woollen Mills for popularity in exhibit. The Umatilla Flour & Grain Co. has its goods in the W. J. Clarke hardware store, Allen-Knight's, Taylor Hardware Co., and the American National Bank. Walters Flour is shown in the Taylor Hardware Co., the American National Bank and in several grocers. The Pendleton Roller Mills has flour in the bank exhibit. In addition to the locally produced goods, the exhibit of flour from all four mills in the American National Bank is a feature of the foodstuffs show. The by products of the milling business, displayed in Allen-Knight's by the Umatilla Flour & Grain Co., are along the educational line.

Local Goods Prominent  
Soyers, Alexanders, The Peoples Warehouse, Bond Brothers and The Workmen's Store show products of the Woollen Mill prominently. In addition to the brightly colored blankets, robes and scarves, the clothing store display Bishops Woollens, a suiting cloth made by the mill here.

Soft drinks made by the William Roesch Company make up one of the most interesting of the displays. The entire window of Sol Baum's curio shop contains these goods. There are bottled soft drinks and bottles of Bran Nue, gaily colored with streamers leading from walls and ceiling. Little paper airplanes, tokens to be given youngsters who call, decorate the window. A few bottles of Bran Nue and some sandwiches form a lunch setting that it designed to be most appetizing.

Butter Display Attractive  
The Golden West butter display in the Alexander grocery is a striking one. One of the features is a case of butter, the work of Mrs. James Hayes, of Riverdale. There are cubes of butter in cartons, there is bulk butter and packed butter. The Golden West effect is carried out in the background, making the showing attractive.

Photographs made in Oregon and ivory furniture, forming a bedroom set, occupy the windows of the Crawford Furniture Store. Rooms of Oregon manufacture are featured in displays by the Bee Hive and the George C. Baer hardware store. The Baer store also has a display of tents, awnings and waterproof water bags made by the Willamette Tent Co., of Portland.

bounds it on the south, all surrounding an area of nearly 3000,000 acres. This area is in Umatilla Morrow and Gilliam Counties, a strip of land nine to twelve miles wide extending from Butter Creek to Blackfoot Station west of Arlington, the center of it lies south of Boardman where Carty reservoir has been surveyed and named for Jim Carty, the big general sheep man of Morrow County. The 1900 foot elevation or contour line on the south is a dividing line between the wheat fields of Morrow County and the bunch grass and sage plains that border the Columbia. Above this elevation it is impractical to divert the waters of the John Day river and reservoir facilities are more difficult and costly. The proposed area in three times larger than the combined areas of all the irrigation districts now in operation between John and Arlington. Where 100,000 acres are not under courses of reclamation, with the John Day, the Umatilla-John Day-Columbia basin would become a second Yakima with 400,000 acres teeming with wealth and happy people instead of taxless waste and barren gloom.

30 Miles From Pendleton  
The John Day Project is 30 miles from Pendleton, five miles from Hermiston, two miles from Boardman, 25 from Heppner, 2 from Arlington and only 14 from Portland. It is a

Keop-pens show Denny's Baby Food, an Oregon product made in Portland, and Keoppe, a local foot powder.

Baskets Made in Oregon  
Baskets and woodenware made in this state share honors with local flour in the windows of the Taylor Hardware Co. Oregon hardware is also shown by the W. J. Clarke Co. in connection with its flour exhibits.

Paints and accessories, Oregon made, are attracting attention in L. J. McAttee's windows. Meat products from the Union Meat Co., Portland, are given space by Gray Brothers, grocers, Oregon, canned goods are featured by nearly all the grocers. Pendleton and Oregon made sweets are exhibited by local confectionery stores. The Palm has placed in its window a cow and milkman, all made of candy. There are even the milk pails and udder, simulated with sugar in the form of candy. The Delta shows Vogans candies and the Wisteria cooling drinks and ices.

Wide Range Displayed  
Oregon agates, which are popular jewelry, make up the window display of A. L. Schaeffer. The J. C. Penney store and Bond Brothers have wood process displays along with their finished products. Tabaca shows a Pendleton made saddle and chaps. The Bond Brothers have also Oregon shoes. Crankshaw & Hampton show cedar chests and Oregon made trunks. The exhibits have been piling up rapidly since yesterday and by night every store window in town is expected to have some display of Oregon goods. Judges will start work probably tomorrow or Thursday. The judging committee consists of R. M. Mayberry, chairman; H. W. Dickson, Edwin Winter, H. Sherman Mitchell and Harry L. Koch.

## HARDING SAYS HE BELIEVES IN UNIONISM

Republican Nominee Has Made no Statement But Past Expressions as Senator Are Taken as Indicating Views.

## WOULD HIT PROFITEERS AT EVERY OPPORTUNITY

"Freedom Glorified in Righteous Restraint" is Sentiment Attributed to Candidate for Presidential Mansion.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—While neither Senator Harding nor his friends have given any intimation regarding the proposed policies Harding will outline in accepting the republican presidential nomination, republicans here believe he will adhere to the views already expressed as senator. Some of Harding's ideas on public questions, as outlined in speeches in the senate and elsewhere, follow: "I believe in union labor. I practice what I preach. But unionism must not assume governmental domination; neither must capital." "Frankly I'd strike at profiteering on every hand. It is hateful, it is menacing, it is offensive against public policy and the law. I rejoice in high wages." "Our American course is straight ahead, with liberty under the law and freedom glorified in righteous restraint."

Will Retain Seat.  
WASHINGTON, June 15.—Harding will retain his seat in the United States senate until his term expires March 4, next, he announced. He added that his petition for re-election to the senate filed in Columbus last week will be withdrawn. The resignation of Harding from the senate probably would result in the overturn of the republican majority in that body as Governor Cox, democrat, would probably appoint a democrat to serve out Harding's term. That would make 33 republicans and 48 democrats in the senate, giving the vice president power to break a tie.

## PROCTOR FLAYS OLD GUARD FOR FIGHT THAT DOWNED WOOD

Statement by Nicholas Murray Butler Rouses Ire of Soap Manufacturer Who Says Butler Shields Old Guard.

CINCINNATI, June 15.—William C. Proctor, millionaire soap manufacturer and admitted contributor of half a million to General Wood's presidential nomination campaign, issued a statement flaying the "old guard" and Nicholas Murray Butler for Wood's defeat. Proctor is particularly incensed at Butler for the latter's statement that Wood's campaign was backed by "financial gamblers." "That statement is maliciously false," said Proctor. "No contributions were made to Wood's campaign beside those I mentioned in my testimony before the United States senate investigating committee. Dr. Butler is trying to square the 'old guard' for what they did to Wood."

## JACK DEMPSEY ACQUITTED BY FEDERAL JURY

World's Heavyweight Pugilistic Champion is Free of Draft Evasion Charge After 10 Minutes of Deliberation.

## DEMPSEY'S OWN TALK CONVINCED THE JURY

Former Wife of Pugilist Had Sought to Show He Swore Falsely When He Made Out Questionnaire During War.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—William Harrison (Jack) Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, found not guilty of the selective draft evasion indictment by a jury in the United States district court here today.

The jury was out ten minutes. Judge Dooling's instructions occupied 20 minutes. Following the verdict Dempsey, his parents and attorneys were stormed by friends offering congratulations. Both sides submitted the case without argument.

## Dempsey Convinced Jury

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—Maxine Dempsey, former wife of the champion heavyweight, had charged Dempsey swore falsely when he asserted in his draft questionnaire he was the sole support of herself and his aged father and mother. Dempsey, the star witness for the defense, told a convincing story of his career during the war when he boxed at numerous big benefits. He told of his desire to enlist after he fulfilled his obligation to his family.

## Will Start Training

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—"Jack Dempsey will start training immediately, and be ready to meet anyone in two weeks," Jack Kearns stated following the verdict acquitting the champion.

"I am the happiest kid on earth," said Dempsey when the verdict was announced.

Mrs. Williams and her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Earl Williams, of this city, returned this morning after attending the grand army convention at Astoria.

Through Mrs. Williams, the convention was brought to Pendleton for 1921. It is a honor that probably never will befall this city again, she said today, inasmuch as the veterans are becoming fewer each year. The veterans are anxious to be entertained here and Mrs. Williams is anxious for Pendleton to show them the time of their lives.

Pendleton's invitation to the veterans arrived less than five minutes before that of Salem and won for this city the convention.
