JOHN DAY PROJECT

(Continued from page 1.)

small empire in the center of northern Oregon under the water shed of our own Blue Mountains and all it needs is water.

A 200 page volume has been printed on the John Day and copies may be found in the office of Percy Cupper, State engineer at Salem. It contains many maps and facts of great value. The authors and compilers are John T. Whitaker, former Project Manager at Hermiston and John H. Lewis, former State engineer. Surveys were made by many well known reclamation engineers and funds for the work were provided by the State and the Department of the Interior. The work was completed in 1915. The cost of survey as set forth in the volume was approximately \$125,000.00. The first work done on the John Day lands was when the preliminary surveys were made in the West End of Umatilla County that resulted in the adoption of the Umatilla Project. This was in 1904-5. On account of the magnitude of the John Day the work was abandoned in favor of the smaller project.

Field Work Resumed
Again in 1908 field work was resumed by the United States Reclamation Service and in 1914 the preliminary surveys described in the printed volume were completed. A large part of the lands including Public and Northern Pacific railway lands are now held in reserve by the U. S. Reclamation Service and the water rights and reservoir sites on the John Day are also held by the United States for future use on these lands. Rentals for grazing purposes are collected and applied to U. S. Reclamation work in the Umatilla-John Day districts. While the government is protecting the lands and water possibilities for the public it is no sense a dog in the manager and will surrender its protectorate to any legitimate organization that will develop these lands. And in these matters the same Mr. and Mrs. General public should be deeply concerned.

The development of the John Day Project must be wholly in the interest of the State and Public welfare and no profits should be permitted to accrue to the speculator. The great purpose is the better and the agricultural returns from the products of his labor. At all hazards the very best opportunity possible and the returns to the State must be through his success and not through speculation that leaves but one bursted bubble and blasted hopes.

District is Formed

In 1919 the John Day Irrigation District was formed under the laws of the State of Oregon and it is now prepared legally to do business with the U. S. Reclamation Service and to issue bonds for construction work. A board of directors with C. C. Clark of Arlington, as chairman, were elected and it is under stood that John H. Lewis, formerly State engineer of Oregon or a man of similar character and wide reputation will soon be selected as chief engineer and more detailed preliminary surveys will soon be commenced. Negotiations for the sale of bonds will also be attempted. The low state of the U. S. Reclamation fund precludes present possibilities of aid from government sources. If the next Congress awakens to the needs of irrigation in the west and makes a liberal appropriation, and the Smith-Chamberlain bill becomes a law, aid may be obtained under this act.

Finally, the merits of the project are so great that capitalists may be induced to buy the bonds. The program is large and much is yet to be accomplished but the project is feasible and the benefits beyond any estimate. There is an abundant water supply. The soil is rich and the topography smooth. The land values now do not exceed \$5.00 to \$10 per acre. With water and in alfalfa adjoining at Boardman the same kind of land cannot be bought for less than \$250.00 per acre and is yielding net annual returns from \$75.00 to \$100.00 per acre. Under such circumstances the cost of reclamation can be paid for with less than two seasons' crop. Yakima valley's irrigation works cost \$40,000,000. The crops of that valley were sold last year for \$35,000,000. Is the John Day possible?

Interest is Aroused.

The purpose of the Boardman bar-becue was to create public interest in the John Day project and to inspire confidence in the safety of investment in John Day bonds. It was shown what may be expected from the reclamation of these lands. Capitalists of Portland were invited to attend and over 2000 people came from within 50 miles. All were impressed with the soundness of the claims of the directors of the John Day project. The people of the Boardman district and

the directors of the John Day are entitled to unstinted praise for their skill and enterprise in conducting such an important preliminary affair in behalf of the great undertaking. Such work is just as necessary as surveys and ditch digging. Success in any big public enterprise lies first in securing the interest and support of the people who may be affected. But there is a big task outlined. It is not for Boardman or the directors to do alone but it is one set for the three contiguous counties and for the entire state.

FREIGHT TRUCK BURNS AFTER TURNING OVER

First following the overturning of a motor truck between Weston and Athena at 2:30 yesterday afternoon completely burned the machine, owned by the Patriotic Transfer Co., of Walla Walla. The load of freight on the truck was thrown clear of the wreck when the car capsized and, except for mud, was little damaged.

Robert Gray, driver, and a woman and two children whose names have not been learned, were uninjured when the car went over. A slippery spot on the road, which is a detour from the main highway, and a slight list to the load are believed responsible for the accident.

Gasoline spilling from the tank ignited on the hot exhaust pipe and burned all the wood work on the machine. The tires were saved and the engine is believed undamaged.

CHOLERA THREATENING THE ENTIRE CRIMEA

THEODOSIA, CRIMEA, June 15.—An epidemic of cholera is threatening the whole Crimea and within the next fortnight there have been in Theodosia about 87 cases, with 34 deaths. Dr. Nicholas Dolzovoff, formerly Minister of Health for Southern Russia and a distinguished sanitary officer in the volunteer army, has been made Medical Director of the Crimea for the American Red Cross, which is the only foreign relief organization here assisting the Russian authorities in their fight to get the epidemic under control.

Many infected soldiers have come here recently from the Caucasus. A general sanitary clean-up of the district has been ordered.

Preventive measures are also being taken against the recurrence of the dreaded small-pox epidemic.

PENROSE ELATED OVER SELECTION OF HARDING

PHILADELPHIA, June 15.—Senator Boise Penrose in a statement last night expressed his elation over Senator Harding's nomination for the presidency. The statement follows, in part.

"As is well known, I have been partly relegated to the rear on account of sickness, but even though I was not permitted to take part in the battle at Chicago, the final result of the contest for the presidential nomination could not be more satisfactory to me.

"I say advisedly that the country is fortunate and the situation is fully met. Senator Harding as president will know how to control affairs at home as well as command the respect of foreign nations."

Senator Penrose sent the following congratulatory telegram to Senator Harding.

"I extend my sincere congratulations upon your nomination. You know I was one of the earliest advocates of your fitness for the office and was prepared at any opportunity to go in and promote your candidacy. With your sterling Americanism and long public and executive experience you have pre-eminent qualifications which appeal to the people. You belong to the type of statesmen who are qualified to act as president and, being convinced that the American people are to restore the republican party to power in November, I have a certainty of your election and confidence in a great administration at your hands. I hope to be able to take my full part in the campaign and shall do everything in my power to help you win."

THE DALLES PASTOR IS TO BE THE PRESIDING HEAD OF CONVENTION

In the absence of the president of the convention, the honor of presiding falls upon the shoulders of the vicar-chancellor, H. E. Rossell, popular pastor of the First Church at The Dalles. B. Wirth, the Pendleton insurance broker. He will also deliver a sermon, in addition to his duties as presiding officer during the sessions of the convention at the First Christian church June 16-20.
