Wife Released, Man Released.

Doig McDonald was released from the city jail this morning after police court waited in vain for his wife to appear to testify against him on a charge of beating her. She had her husband arrested last evening by police, declaring that he had come home and torn up all her clothes and other-

wise abused her. She refused to appear this morning to press the case against him. Chief of Police Roberts said, and the man was released.

Mrs. Emma Ferris, of Smethport, Pa., is searching for her son, Judson Ferris, said to have signed up with the U. S. Biological Survey office in Pendleton as a goat trapper. The office, now located in Portland, has no

record of the man, but it is thought that he is in this vicinity. His mother has not heard from him for over a year.

Little Boy Dies.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. William Dorrans, of Helix, died in Pendleton yesterday. Funeral services will be held in Helix.

Dies at Hospital.

Wrennie Green, aged 35, died last night at St. Anthony's hospital. Mr. Green's home was in Adams. Funeral services are to be held in Athena tomorrow.

Three Have Diphtheria.

There are three cases of diphtheria in Pendleton, says Dr. H. J. Kavanaugh, city physician. He states that the disease is not in a malignant form and that the patients who have it are closely quarantined to prevent its spread.

Rainfall Is .61 Inches.

Today's rainfall totals .61 inches, with the showers still falling and a prospect of continued moisture. The maximum temperature, says Major Moorhouse, weather observer, is 65 with a minimum of 59. The barometer registers 29.60, which is indicative of continued storm.

Green Funeral Is Tomorrow.

The funeral of the late Wrennie Green, of Adams, who died Sunday night, will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Baptist church in Athena. Rev. J. J. Haslam will conduct the services and the funeral will be in charge of the Oddfellow lodge, of which the deceased was a member.

Rationing of Sugar.

Monday is the date set for the return of the rationing of sugar, a relic of the days of the recent war. Local hotels and restaurants are making plans to carry out the order. Some eating houses have already banished the sugar bowl from the table and are allotting a certain amount to each patron.

New Bird Refuge Petition Here.

The Pendleton Commercial Association and others here today received blank petitions from the Roosevelt Bird Refuge Association to be circulated locally for the initiative ballot in the general election. The petitions are for a revised compromise bill regarding the Roosevelt Bird Refuge in Harney county. According to W. S. U'Ren, attorney for the association sending out the petitions, a compromise satisfactory to both sides in the controversy has been effected and the compromise measure is expected to go on the ballot and be carried. Several petitions are already in circulation here.

OFFICIAL WAITING FOR JACK JOHNSON

SAN DIEGO, June 15.—United States immigration authorities expect to have Jack Johnson, the pugilist, under arrest here before night, they announced. Cantu officials at Tijuana, where Johnson has been in the cafe business for several months, stated he had been given 24 hours to leave lower California. Johnson has been a fugitive from justice for several years, being wanted at Chicago on a white slave charge.
"We've been informed Johnson will cross the line soon," an immigration official told the United Press. "In case he does we'll hold him for the department of justice." Cantu officials at Tijuana charge Johnson had been in trouble several times in the border town since making his home there, so told him to leave. They also said they feared to have a fight between Johnson and a white contender as planned, due to possible race troubles.

LOUISIANA FAILS TO RATIFY SUFFRAGE

BATON ROUGE, June 15.—A proposal to ratify the woman suffrage amendment was defeated in the lower house of the Louisiana state assembly today, 67 to 44. The senate defeated the resolution last week.

LABOR OPPOSES ALL FORCED ARBITRATION

MONTREAL, June 15.—Repeal of the labor section of the Esch-Cummins transportation act is demanded in a resolution by the American Federation of labor convention adopted unanimously.

The railroad labor board is organized under the Esch-Cummins act. Other resolutions adopted include: condemning universal military training; urging immediate passage of the Nolan minimum wage bill for federal employees; demanding higher wage standard for postal employees; urging strict enforcement of the seamen's law; calling on the rank and file to oppose compulsory arbitration in all its forms.

Calling on President Wilson, Attorney General Palmer and congress to release political prisoners.
Ordering the executive council to continue its efforts to obtain the release of Thomas Mooney, convicted in connection with the San Francisco preparedness day bomb plot.

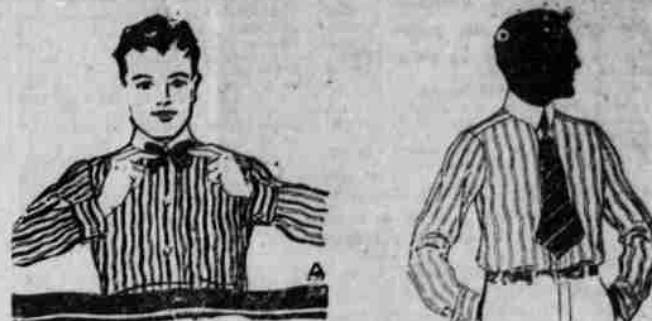
