License Issued Today.

Mitchell Estate Is Admitted.

The estate of the late George W. Mitchell was admitted to probate today. Nellie St. Dennis and Edward L. Mitchell were appointed joint administrators. W. L. Snook, James A. King and Grady Herndon were appointed to appraise the estate.

De Young Estate Admitted.

The estate of the late Peter De Young, who was killed in an auto accident recently in Illinois, was admitted to probate today. Mrs. Myrtle De Young, the widow, was appointed administratrix. The deceased left an estate estimated to be worth about \$7000. J. N. Scott, J. W. Maloney and William Milne were appointed appraisers.

Scott Gets Stiff Fine.

Buster Scott, who was arrested recently at Pilot Rock with five gallons of moonshine, was fined \$300 recently at Pilot Rock with five months yesterday in the county court. The jail sentence was suspended on good behavior but Scott must pay the fine. This is one of the stiff penalties yet inflicted for violation of the liquor laws in this county.

Thirteen Seek Citizenship.

Thirteen foreigners are now on the complete list of applicants for final citizenship papers. They will be heard at the September term of circuit court, September 14. The final day for filing was today, as names must be posted 90 days before the hearing. The last two to file are Harold Elders, of Pendleton, a native of Norway and Andrew Miller, of Freewater, a native of Ireland.

Paper License Proves Fraudulent.

Philip Weiskels, an Idaho Indian, was fined \$10 in the justice court today on a charge of driving an auto with an improper license. The car he owns has borne a paper tag on which was printed an Idaho dealer's license number. Inquiry of the secretary of state at Boise revealed that the car bearing this license had never made application for a permanent license and the owner was arrested by Traffic Officer Lyday following receipt of the information.

Prisoners to Go South.

The sheriff of San Jose county, California, will shortly send a deputy here to take back George Foster and Jack Foss, arrested Saturday afternoon by Sheriff Taylor, Deputy Sheriff Martin and Traffic Officer William Lyday on Birch Creek. The car stolen belongs in California and as the local officers have no charge to prefer against the pair, they likely will be extradited. The sheriff received word to hold them until a man comes for them from the south.

Restraining Order Issued.

An order restraining James Hoskins, of Stanfield, from discharging surplus irrigating water from his ranch by means of two pipes under the government feed canal there was signed by County Judge C. A. Mason today in the absence of Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps. The order was asked in a complaint filed against James and William Hoskins by the Copeland Investment Co., Inc., whose lands adjoin those of the defendants. In the complaint, the plaintiff alleges that because of the system of carrying off surplus water from the Hoskins place, six acres of his lands are subject to ruination by alkali deposits and the hay crop also endangered. The complaint prays for the restraining order and other relief as the court may see fit.

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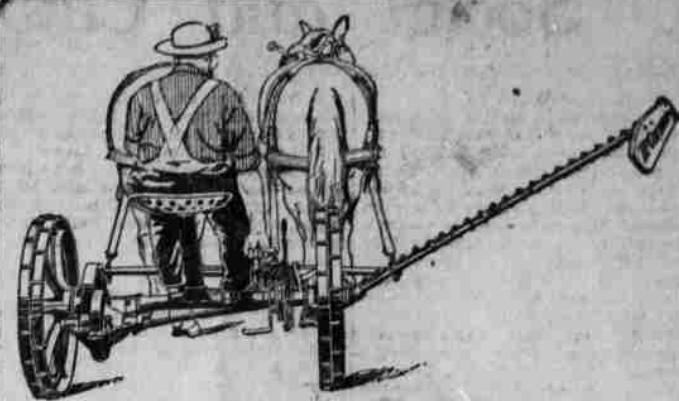
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
