AMERICAN FLAG MUST STAND FOR PEACE

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Asserting the American flag must be made the vitalizing symbol of world peace, Secretary Daniels, addressing a flag day mass meeting on the steps of the capitol last night, called on American citizens to turn a deaf ear to the "selfish and provincial pleas" which renounce the "altruism that sent the American army overseas."

He said that because "some Americans had lacked vision and forgotten the ideals which made us invincible in war, the promised blessing of the confict peace buttressed by mutual co-operation between the allied and associated nations has not been realized."

"But we will not scuttle in the hour of our own and the world's need," he continued. "Let us reconsecrate ourselves to the attainment of peace and justice between all nations. Let us here highly resolve that the dead of this war shall not have died in vain but that from their sacrifice shall come anew and wider and holier service to humanity."

MARINE WIRELESS MEN WANT HIGHER WAGES

LONDON, June 16.—A strike of marine wireless operators was declared this morning by the association of wireless telegraphists. The men demand a wage increase of approximately 180 per cent of the pre-war rates and better conditions of employment.

WOMAN MAY BE MADE LABOR V-PRESIDENT

(By United Press.)

MONTREAL, June 15.—The American federation of labor may elect a



woman vice-president for the first time in history at the annual convention in session here. Mrs. Sarah Conboy, of New York, a representative of the textile workers union, is now believed to have the best chance for election if plans are carried through.

The federation has twelve vice-presidents, who, together with President Gompers and Secretary Morrison, form the powerful executive council. To insure the election of a woman it is planned to amend the federal constitution to create 15 vice presidents.
