Edwards—Vanished halls and cathedrals of France.
This American artist and tourist long familiar with the ravaged regions of northern France describes and pictures the now vanished glories of Reims, Noyon, Arras, Leon, Verdun, St. Quentin, and many other towns and villages which were destroyed in the war. The volume is beautifully illustrated, printed on specially made paper, and richly bound.
Hubbard—Introduction to the study of landscape design.
