## REQUEST FOR ROOMS WINS QUICK RESPONSE

Quick response to the East Oregonian's request for more rooms to handle the overflow transient trade reached the Pendleton Commercial Association Saturday evening and this morning.

Secretary Cranston added two new houses to his list and received assurance from two formerly on the lists that they will take transient roomers.

With travel heavy at this time, local hotels and rooming houses have often been found completely filled of evenings. Persons arriving on evening trains or by auto have been unable to get accommodations. Even the houses on lists previously prepared declared that they had no space. Thus a call for additional rooms went out. The Commercial Association maintains lists at the various hotels and cigar stores of houses which will provide lodging for transients. The charges are considered reasonable. The association merely acts as agent in gathering the names, addresses and phone numbers of house owners who will help in this manner and turns over their information to the nine places where lists were placed. Secretary Cranston said today he would be glad to have further offers of rooms for handling the overflow trade.
