ARCADIE TODAY PARISIAN HAI MASQUE PICTURE IN "HIS HOUSE IN ORDER"

A faithful reproduction of the Hai Masque, which is given annually in Paris by the students of the Latin Quarter, is one of the most effective scenes in the new Paramount Artcraft picture, "His House in Order," starring Elsie Ferguson which will be shown at the Arcadie Theatre Sunday.
