Noye has had two bouts at Boise and the one in Portland less than a month and has won two and draw the third. Fisk drew with Bronson at Walla Walla to weeks ago

and beat Ted Hoke in Portland Thursday night. He has taken on Joe Gorman and many other good boys in the district west of the Mississippi of late. Fisk also has fought three bouts in the month and since January 1 has been in the ring 17 times.

Better Than Portland Bill. Fans who saw the 111 fight at Portland last Thursday night declare that the dope favors the card here as superior to the Milwaukee card. There was one feature on the Portland card, the appearance of Miltie O'Dowd, former middleweight champ, but for the other numbers the local boys have a better matched lineup, they say.

(By Associated Press.) WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 28.—The British lawn tennis singles championship has narrowed down to four men and of these two are Americans, William T. Tilden of Philadelphia and Charles S. Garland of Pittsburgh. These two American players won their matches handily, while R. Norris Williams II, was put out of the playing by Theodor Mavrogolatos, one of the English teams for the Davis cup.

Tilden won Monday from Randolph Lycett of Australia in the best contest of the day, although he did not have to extend himself to the degree that was necessary when he defeated Kingscote on Saturday. Lycett played a remarkably fast game and won in second set, then Tilden called upon some of his reserve strength and won out with something to spare.

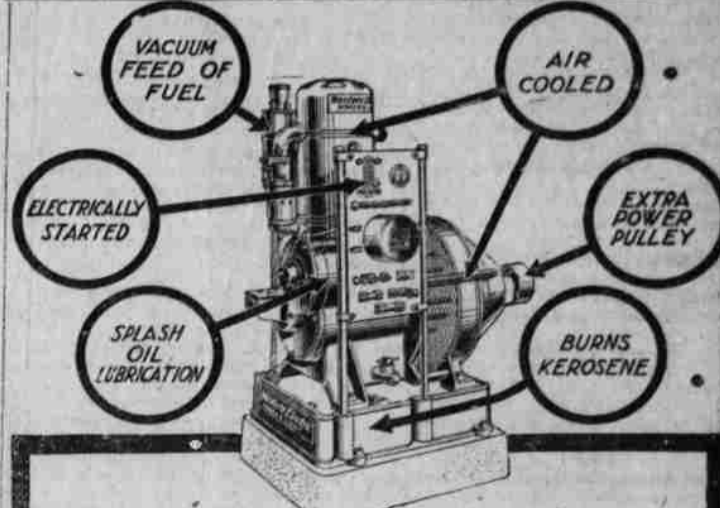
