NEW YORK, June 30.—Declaring the embargo on the transportation of building material by virtue of the recent car shortage, Senator William M. Calder, chairman of the special committee on reconstruction and production yesterday arranged to the interstate commerce commission for a hearing to permit the building industry to present its case.

Senator Calder said he had evidence from leading building material manufacturers that there now is sufficient material at the several plants to meet all present requirements of the industry.

Helix has won nine and lost one game this season and has won at least once from every team in the league. Milton-Freewater has suffered two defeats in nine starts and has a postponed

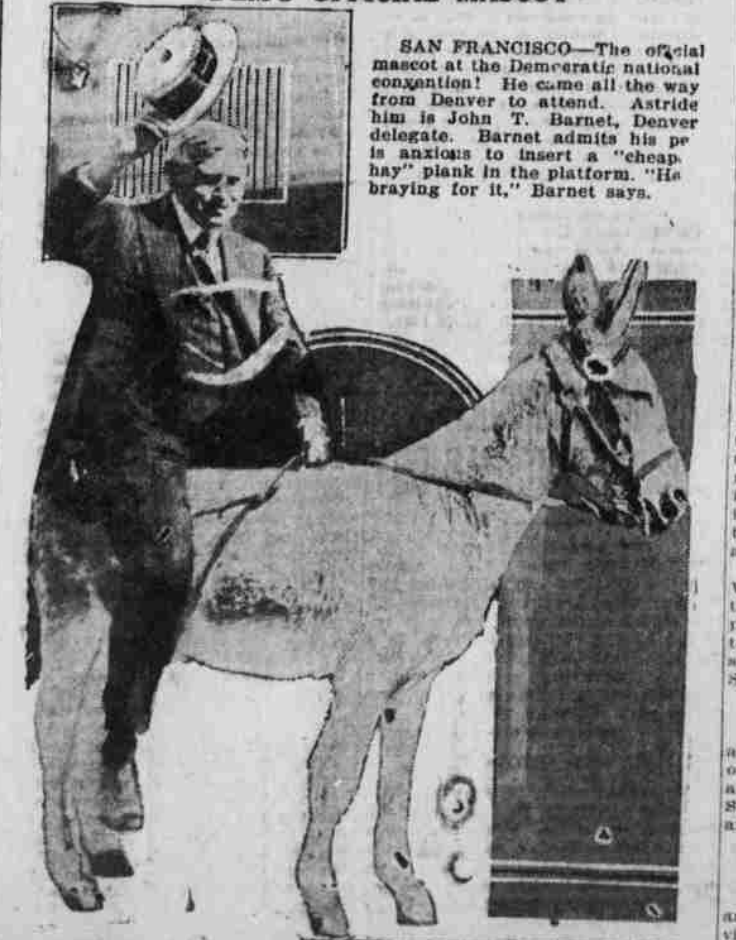

Pilot Rock holds down the fourth rung with five games won and four lost. Walla Walla pulled out of the cellar Sunday by beating Athena and has won one game and lost eight.

Athena has lost all of its nine games. Rex Ellis, president of the league, said today that he considered the season a success in spite of the various obstacles that had to be surmounted. He praised the cooperation given by the managers, players and fans, and said that he never worked with a better bunch of sports. "There were two or three protests during the season but they were settled amicably and everybody is satisfied, he said."
