NEIGHBORS SEEK RELIEF FROM NOISY RELIGION

"They preached and prayed and moaned and groaned until 2:30 a. m.," says complaint against the Apostolic Faith evangelists, filed with the city council last night by 10 citizens with in hearing of their tent near Washington school. "Every night they keep us awake, holding their meetings until after midnight."

TESTIMONY IN WILL CASE SAYS SIGNATURE OF MILLIONAIRE FORGED

CHICAGO, July 1.—James B. Forgan, chairman of the board of directors of the First National Bank of Chicago, testified yesterday in circuit court that the signature of Byron L. Smith, late president of the Northern Trust Company, on the alleged second will of James C. King, millionaire lumberman, was not genuine. Mr. Forgan appeared as a witness for the Northern Trust Company, trustees of the King estate, under the first will which provided for the maintenance of a home for aged men.

Gaston B. Means and Mrs. Mary C. Melvin, sister of King's deceased second wife, seek to have the second will probated.

ORDINANCE CLARIFYING PARKING OF VEHICLES IS PASSED BY COUNCIL

Third System Now in Vogue in City is Instituted by Adaptation of Rules for Streets of 40 Feet or Less Width.

An ordinance clarifying parking of vehicles on Pendleton streets passed the city council last night with the emergency clause attached and is now in effect. It does not affect Main, Court and Alta streets in the blocks where center parking is in vogue.

On all streets of 40 feet or less width, the ordinance requires vehicles to be parked with both front and rear wheels beside the curb. On streets of greater width than 40 feet, except those in which center parking is used, vehicles are to park with the front right wheel to the curb and the car at an angle of 45 degrees.

Three Ways of Parking

Lack of space in front of business houses and garages where cars parked at the angle on narrow streets led to the clarifying of the ordinance. Under terms of the ordinance, cars which park parallel to the curb on streets of 40 feet or less must not be closer together than five feet.

With this ordinance in vogue, Pendleton streets have three distinct systems of parking, according to location. Main, East Court and the block on Alta between Main and Cottonwood are marked for center parking at an angle. Most of the other streets in town will require the new system of parking to be used, although some are more than 40 feet and there the angle system will be retained.

Attention of the council was called to the fact that provision never was made on Alta street and on the block between Thompson and College on East Court for the center parking strip. This will be painted in by the street department as soon as possible.

New Motorcycle Considered

The council voted to confer with the county court regarding the purchase of a new motorcycle for the city-county traffic officer. The machine used by the speed cop was recently smashed up and was unable when in trip, to catch some of the speeders, the officer said.

An ordinance authorizing the fire committee to enter into contract with A. G. Long & Co. for the purchase of the police committee was given power to act on a request from the Central Labor Council that they be granted a permit to show a carnival here late in July. The Foley & Burk Co., of San Francisco, with nearly 200 persons, is the company that is desired and a representative of the company explained his proposal to the council.

Program Will Open Saturday Evening With Lecture Entertainment and Little Citizens Are Asked for Monday A. M.

Ellis Purlee, director for the Pendleton Chautauqua, July 2 to 9, arrived today and is superintending the erection of the big top on the city's property on Alta and Webb streets.

Mr. Purlee states that there is every indication of a successful Chautauqua. The city council last night, after a request from W. W. Harrah of the grounds committee, agreed to have the sprinkler in operation at the grounds as a means of cooling the atmosphere and keeping down the dust.

The program opens Saturday evening with opening exercises and announcements, and a lecture entertainment.

Periera and his quartet will appear in the evening also, and with them will be Mary Adel Hays, soprano, who was a favorite at last year's chautauqua.

Singers On Program.

The Royal Welsh Lady Singers will entertain Chautauqua goers Tuesday afternoon and evening, the latter program being supplemented by a lecture, "The Needs of the Hour," by Judge George D. Alden.

There will be no program Wednesday afternoon, but in the evening the Maurice Brown Players will present "Kindling."

Thursday afternoon and evening, and on that day also will be "Through Five Republics on Horseback," by Dr. G. Whitfield, F. R. G. S., at the afternoon session, and "The Fourth Line of Defense," evening lecture by George G. Hale.

Friday afternoon's program will consist of a prelude by the native Maori singers, a lecture by the Chautauqua director and a public play hour when the Junior Chautauqua will give an exhibition. Blomfield.
